



Neither species of guardianship would be likely to prove very effective. Any conduct that involves or suggests immorality should, of course, be suppressed by the management in its own interest, as well as in the interest of decency. But when we come to "spooning" and lovemaking we are getting on difficult and delicate ground. Conduct that seems very shocking and disgusting to persons of refined sensibilities does not arouse the same ing and always right prices. feeling in those of other classes. Standards of reserve and modesty differ very widely, and the official chaperon would have a hard time deciding what was right and what was wrong. There are some girls who do not like to be kissed in public, though they don't mind dancing the tango or the turkey trot in public. There are others who not only like it but are rather proud that the world should know that they "have a fellow" all their own. Where can we draw the line beteen propriety and impropriety in such cases? In itself is it any more immoral to sit on a bench in public! with a gentleman's arm around yo then to stand up and jump around with his arm about you? One is sanctioned by custom, it may be answered, and the other is not. But that is just the point. In the "Social circles" to which many of these offenders against what we consider refined taste belong it is the custom to practice very little concealment in the "billings and cooings" connected with courtship. Their lavish bestowal of affection in the open may strike us as coarse and vulgar, but to them it may seem the only proper course for true

love to take. We sympathize, however, with what ur correspondent says with respect to defective home training of girls and boys nowadays. This is at the bottom! of immorality on or off shipboard, and it is a very seious matter. Even girls of education and social standing in this generation are not, as a rule, as refined as their grandmothers were. There is a missing link of refinement somewhere, and we think it can generally be found in the home. The way to eradicate coarseness and unrefinement is not by chaperons on boats, but by chaperons at home. "White slaves" are more often made there by lax training and bad example then by the tempters on the outside.






