PROCLAMATION

Proposed Amendment To The Constitution Of Maryland.

WHEREAS, at the January Session of the General Assembly of Maryland, sheld in the year of our Lord One Thou sand Nine Hundred and Fourteen, an Act was passed proposing an Amendment to Section 44, Part VII., of Article 4. title "Sheriffs," of the Constitution of the State of Maryland, which said Act is known and designated as Chap. ter 845 of the Acts of Maryland of 1914, and is in the words and figures follow-

CHAPTER 845.

AN ACT to amend Section 44, Part VII. of Article 4, title, "Sheriffs," of the Constitution of this State, and to provide for the submission of said amendment to the qualified voters of this State for adoption or rejection. Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, threefifths of all the members of each of

the two houses concurring, that the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an amendment to Section 44, Part VII, of Article 4, title "Sheriffs," of the Constitution of this State, and if adopted by legal and qualified voters thereof, as herein prothe place and stead of said Section 44; Part VII, of said Article 4.

Sec. 44. There shall be elected in each county in every second year, one person, resident in said county above the age of twenty-five years, and at least five years preceding his election, citizen of the State, to the office of Sheriff. He shall hold office for two years, and until his successor is duly elected and qualified; shall be ineligible for two years thereafter; shall give such bond, exercise such powers and perform such duties as now are or is P. M. BROOKS, may hereafter be fixed by law. In case of a vacancy by death, resignation, refusal to serve, or neglect to qualify, or give bond, or by disqualification, or removal from the county, the Governor shall appoint a person to be Sheriff for the remainder of the official term.

And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the aforegoing section hereby proposed as an amendment to the Constitution of this State shall be at the next General Election for members of Congress, the same being a general election, to be held in this State, submitted to the Article 14 of the Constitution of this tate, and at said General election the legal and qualified voters thereof for vote on the proposed amendment shall be by ballot, and upon such ballot there shall be printed the words, "For the Constitutional Amendment," and "Against the Constitutional Amendamendment, as directed by the said Sewing Machines, Bicycles. 


