



Quarantined Area: The entire State. Closed Area: Baltimore City and those portions of Baltimore county within a radius of three miles of any infected or

exposed premises. Modified area: Baltimore county outside of a radius of three miles from any infected or exposed premises: Restricted Area: The entire State, except Baltimore city and county.

Free Area: None. The phrase restricted area means: Those portions of the quarantined area from which the interstate and foreign movement of cattle, sheep, other ruminants, and swine is permitted for immediate slaughter to points in the free and closed areas, or for any purpose to any point in the quarantined area other than TO US TO GET in the closed area, and into which such YOUR GLASSES. animals may be moved for any purpose; and of hav, straw, or similar folder, manure, litter, or bags or similar containers which have been used for stock feed, is permitted without any restrictions whatever.


