The Woman's Federated Club advocates the State-Wide Compulsory School Attendance Bill, which is now before the Maryland Legislature. The following are facts of interest:


Since 1900 Maryland has steadily ranked 32nd among the 48 States in the percentage of illiteracy of native whites, ten years of age and over.

In the State last year 42,088 white children whose names were on school registers were out of school, as compared with 14,500 colored children who did not go to school. Shall the illiteracy of one negro child cost Maryland the illiteracy of nearly

The school population of Kent county is 5,651, the number of different pupils 3,705 and the number in average attendance 2.404. Where are the 35 per cent. of known public school children?






