

The city school children are more healthy than the country child, the latter being more physically defective than the former. In spite of all the harmful effects of over crowding in the large city schools, and in some parts the sanitary defects, they are better off in matters of health than those who have the advantages of open air, plenty of exercise and the benefits of which country life is supposed to bestow.

For this condition the State system of education is to blame. Not one State n five cares for the physical well being of the children in the rural districts. 


