BAY SHORE-ROCK HALL BOATS START OCTOBER 15

With the contract for the Bay Shore pier practically assured and the Rock Hall terminus already planned, another Eastern Shore ferry line will soon be a reality, says the Baltimore promoters. It was said that at least two of the boats will be in operation before October 15, when a regular service will be instituted between Bay Shore and Rock Hall. There was a meeting of the board of directors of the Eastern Shore Ferry line Friday, at which it was thought final contract would be let for the Bay Shore dock, but no definite action was taken. However, plans have advanced to such an extent that the ferry is as-

Present plans call for six round trips a day, the first boat leaving at Rock Hall about 6 o'clock in the morning and the first return trip starting about 7.30. There will be accommodations for at least a dozen automobiles on each trip, besides passengers and freight. The road from the main Eastern Shore State highway to the Rock Hall slip is rapidly nearing completion and there will be no delay in starting the ferry on that score. Alterations on the two boats now under way at Sparrows Point are

progressing rapidly. When the line is in operation it is likely that arrangements will be made to cary mail for northern points of the Shore on the ferry, thus cutting down the time between the city and points in Kent, Cecil and Queen Anne's counties.
