BIG DAY IN TOWN

A Parade of American Legion Soldiers—Services at Chester Cemetery—Automobile Parade, Sports and Base Ball—A Great Success.

Memorial Day was observed in Chestertown Monday in a most patriotic and fitting way in honor of the dead heroes whom this country have contributed to the cause of righteousness in the conflicts in which America engaged.

Originally dedicated to the heroes of '61, as well as those of preceding wars, the day has taken on added significance in that it includes those who made the supreme sacrifice in the Spanish and World Wars. So it is well to pause in a realization that those who are enjoying liberty to realize that it has been made possible by those who actively participated in these titanic struggles which have not only preserved the United States, but have also implanted democracy all over the civilized world. This spirit is accountable for the universal observance of the day and the true realization of its significance.

The parade of the American Legion in charge of Capt. Thomas Kibler and headed by the Chestertown Cornet Band, Arthur Bacon, director, marched to Chester Cemetery where memorial services were held under the direction of Chaplain Omar E. Jones. Rev. N. O. Gibson offered prayer, after which addresses were made by Dr. Clarence P. Gould and Col. John T. Ford, of Cecil county. John Davis, one of the Legion and a post-graduate at Washington College, read the following:

"Abraham Lincoln, speaking on November 19, 1863, at the dedication of the National Cemetery on the battlefield of Gettysburg, paid this tribute to the soldier dead:

"But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate—we cannot consecrate, we hallow—this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember, what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is for us, the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is, rather, for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us—that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion—that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain—that this nation, under God, shall have a birth of freedom—and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

The graves decorated included Thos. Ivens, Frank Jarman and T. Kemp Bordley. Flowers were sent to parents of boys who are buried in other cemeteries in Kent.

The soldiers, numbering 43, marched with beautiful precision and time while the band furnished splendid musical accompaniment with equal step to that of the soldier boys.

In the afternoon the parade of decorated automobiles drew a large crowd to town and proved quite an interesting affair. The Chestertown Band enlivened the occasion with fine music. The car driven by Mrs. S. S. Beck and beautifully trimmed to represent Japan, won first prize which Mrs. Beck at once turned over to the American Legion. The second prize was won by Jack Sparks, of Sudderville, and third by John E. Barnes with "Cupid Car."

Among the other cars worthy of mention was that of Goldie Lamb, of Westville, N. J., with his "Charlie Chaplin" representation and bevy of pretty girls inside. Then there was Dr. J. H. Hughes' car with "Mike" on guard on the radiator, the Rose Bud Flour Car with John Hadaway at the wheel looking as if he knew "Rose Bud" at home even if his car failed to get the prize. W. P. Newnam's car was especially good depicting the spirit of the day. Inside was seated Col. Wm. J. Vannort attired in his G. A. R. uniform, and Chaplain Omar E. Jones in his World War uniform.

Over the top were the words "Lest We Forget." C. A. Goodwin, A. L. Sterling, Clarence Newcomb, A. S. Turner, Jas. G. Beck, Goldie Warren, Dumont Lambert, Chas. Eshman, Miss Hill, Norman Lee, Owen C. Smith, Carle Bordley, Mr. Barclay and others. The judges were Dr. E. J. Clarke, O. C. Blades, W. B. Copper, Mrs. C. A. Corwin, Mrs. Thomas Massey.
