The usual annual starting salaries are as indicated.

Tests to be held July 16, as follows: Senior Statistical Clerk (open and promotional)—\$1000 to \$1200. Junior Statistical Clerk—\$840 to \$960. Field Inspector—\$900. Road Inspector—\$900. Parole Officer—\$900 to \$1200. Civil Engineering Aid (promotional)—\$900 to \$1400. Assistant Physician (Mental Diseases)—\$1500 to \$1800.
