

Health Nurse Attends Convention.

Mrs. Thomas Massey, Public Health Nurse for Kent County, was sent as a delegate to attend the National Tuberculosis Convention and the Health Conference of the Atlantic Division of the American Red Cross. Both were held in New York City at the same time, June 14, 15, 16, 17. The problem of the discharged soldier developing tuberculosis was discussed. The difficulties of first: the government and later the U. S. Public Health Service were brought. The work was turned over to the U. S. P. H. S. in March 1919. At this time hospitals and other facilities were inadequate and the work was slow. By the middle of the year 1920 the work was in good order.

The subject receiving most attention was that of prevention of disease and this subject was fully discussed at both conferences. Malnutrition and its alleviation by the teaching of health habits and proper food was fully discussed.

Dental work for the school children is considered one of the best avenues of attack as 90% of our children need dental care. Bad teeth are of the root cause of the undernourished child is brought up to normal. Are we not preventing disease?

The nation was represented at this convention and they are all working out ways to better the health of our children. What can we do to this end?

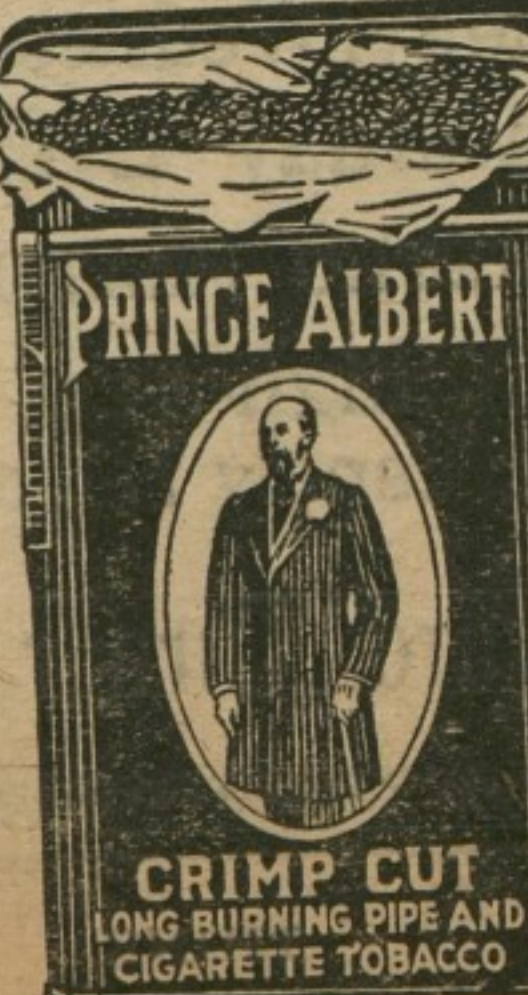

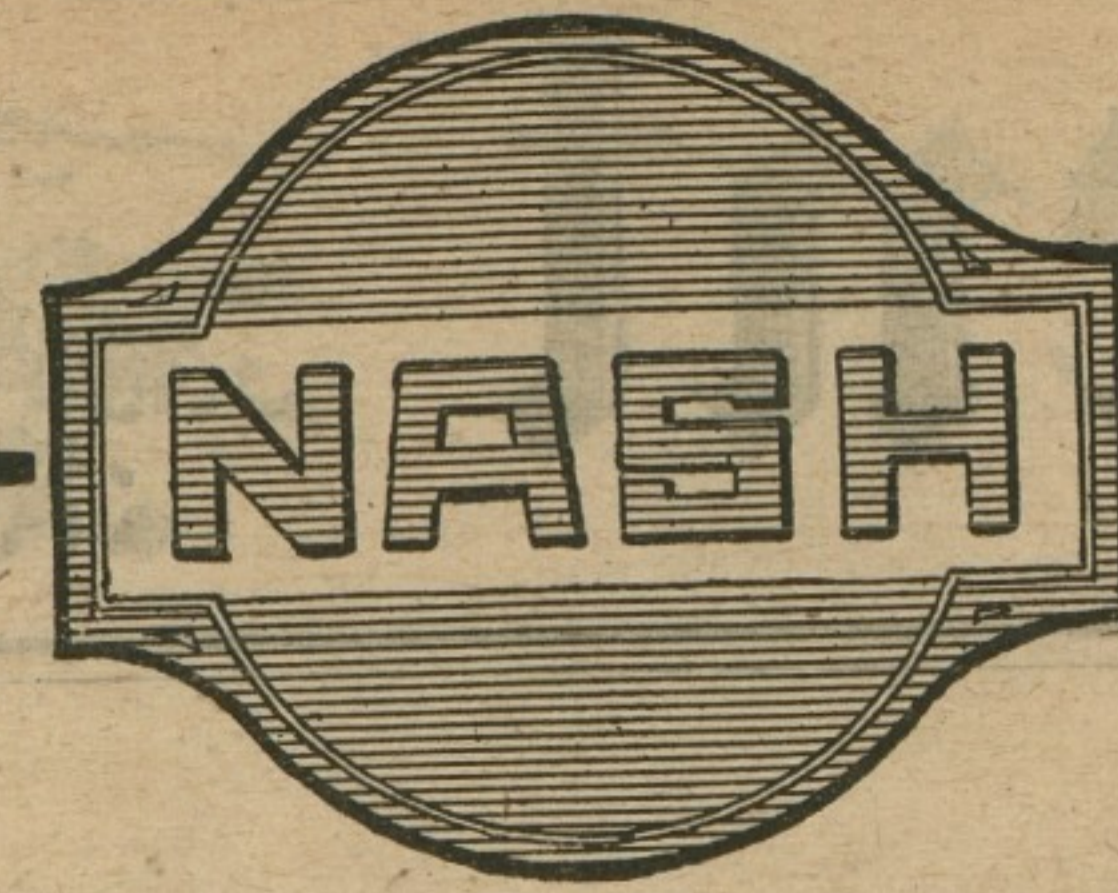
