LOCAL NOTES

Wm. E. Deford, of near Rock Hall, lost two horses by lightning last week. Midnight fishing off Chester bridge is quite the thing if you want to catch a fine lot of rock and perch.

The Lem Powell place, near Chester bridge was sold at public sale last Saturday to William McGinnis for \$5500.

Six white boys were each fined \$7.15 for throwing stones at Silas Saul's house on Scott's Point.

It is reported that a new hotel will be built at Betterton by Horace K. Read, of Philadelphia. The proposed hotel is to be of brick construction, of seventy-five rooms.

The Chestertown wrapper factory closed last Saturday for two weeks.

The room on Court street next door to Thomas W. Perki's office, has been rented to the State Road commission as headquarters for Supt. Shure.

The Howard Jones garage, etc., were sold at public sale Saturday to friends of Mr. Jones for \$2100. The place of business was reopened at once.

The large sale of George R. Rasin in Centreville, was largely attended. The place was well attended and everything sold.

The Chestertown Commissioners on Friday were ready to award the bonds for \$10,000 fire equipment but there were no bids. This matter will have to be deferred until money becomes more plentiful.

M. Rosen, who formerly lived in Chestertown, has sold his Centreville shoe business and left on Thursday for New York, from where he will sail shortly for Russia. Mr. Rosen is his native country in Wesley Chapel, Md., where he has a home.

S. Scott Beck, assignee, sold Tuesday in Centreville, at public auction, the "Providence" farm, situated along the Pennsylvania railroad between Carville and Ashland, and under the cultivation of John V. Willis. This farm contains 370 acres and was sold to Mrs. Ella Perry Skinner, of Swarthmore, Pa., at \$50.25 per acre.

Ralph Zeisel, of Philadelphia, has purchased the Zeisel property in Queen Anne's, near town, from Mrs. L. W. Wickes. Charles Eickman is tenant on the place.

P. W. Graves, who bought the Harvey Morris farm, had an unusual experience last Friday. He came to town in the morning and had some cows insured and within two and a half hours two of them were killed by lightning. They were insured for \$100 each and were fine cattle.

Charles Griffith, piano tuner, whose home is in Baltimore, and who was recently arrested at Betterton, by Sheriff Seib, of Cecil, and carried to the county jail, charged with having stolen an automobile tire from Mrs. Leonard Pryor's car in Chesapeake City, is again in trouble. Mrs. Pryor dropped the charges against him. He is now charged with having stolen a pair of field glasses from the home of Frank Robinson, in Kent county, where he tuned a piano. The glasses were in his possession, it is alleged, when he was taken. Griffith is now a prisoner in Kent county jail.

Chestertown Council No. 58 Daughters of America was visited by six of the State officers on Monday evening last. Quite a large attendance of members of the local order being present. After the business meeting addresses were made by the State Councilor, Mrs. Elizabeth Primrose; State Vice Councilor, Mrs. Lillie Earlebeck; Junior Past Councilor, Mrs. Mattie Brown; Associate Junior Past Councilor, Mrs. Emma Hamner; State Secretary, Mrs. Mary L. July's exit occurred Sunday in a torrid wave of heat that made life almost intolerable, clinched her claim and set her record as the hottest July since the summer of 1876. The month took her departure in a flare of heat, the mercury noting 90 at the hot period of the day. Everybody who has fumed and fretted at the heat that has persisted for the last forty days declare that the almost six weeks just past have been the hottest ever recorded in this section, but they, of course, do not remember the summer of Centennial year, which was far away the most grilling that even the grandparents of the "oldest inhabitant" might have recalled. The heat then began early in June and lingered almost without break until towards the middle of September, and he for the grateful chill of autumn had arrived nearly everyone was wearied and exhausted from the long strain.

The fish, which seemed to bite best at night, were caught trolling off Swamp Point Bar. Starting on Wednesday night, Charles L. Merriken and Friend Bird, fishing with Capt. Spencer Urie, landed 54 rock that tipped the scales from 1 to 12 pounds. Thursday night Frank Merriken, Wm. Ortmann and Howard Taylor got 64 of the big fellows that ran up to 10 pounds each. Friday night James P. Offutt and James Kell, fishing with Capt. Charles Harrison, caught 50 rock and 30 hardheads. Saturday night Edward Horrick and Messrs. Kitzell and Marshall and W. A. Tingle, of the United States Shipping Board, got 62 rock, 40 hardheads and a number of perch; and on Saturday night and Sunday William A. Wilson and a Mr. Clagett, fishing with Capt. Spencer Urie, landed 54 rock tailed 125 pounds. The parties went out from the home of Capt. Ben Ashley.
