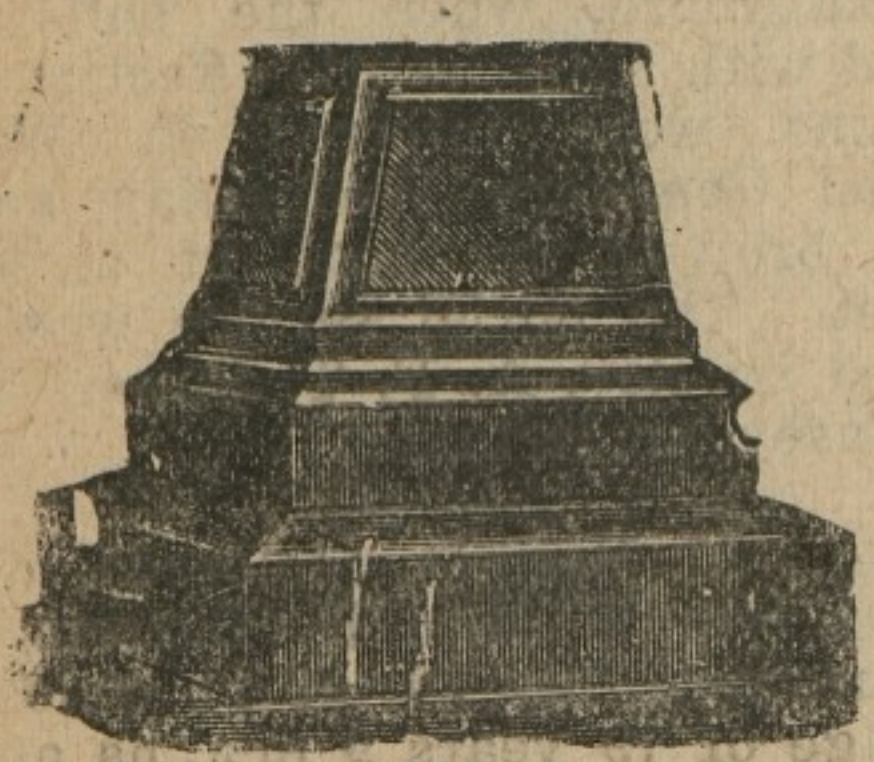

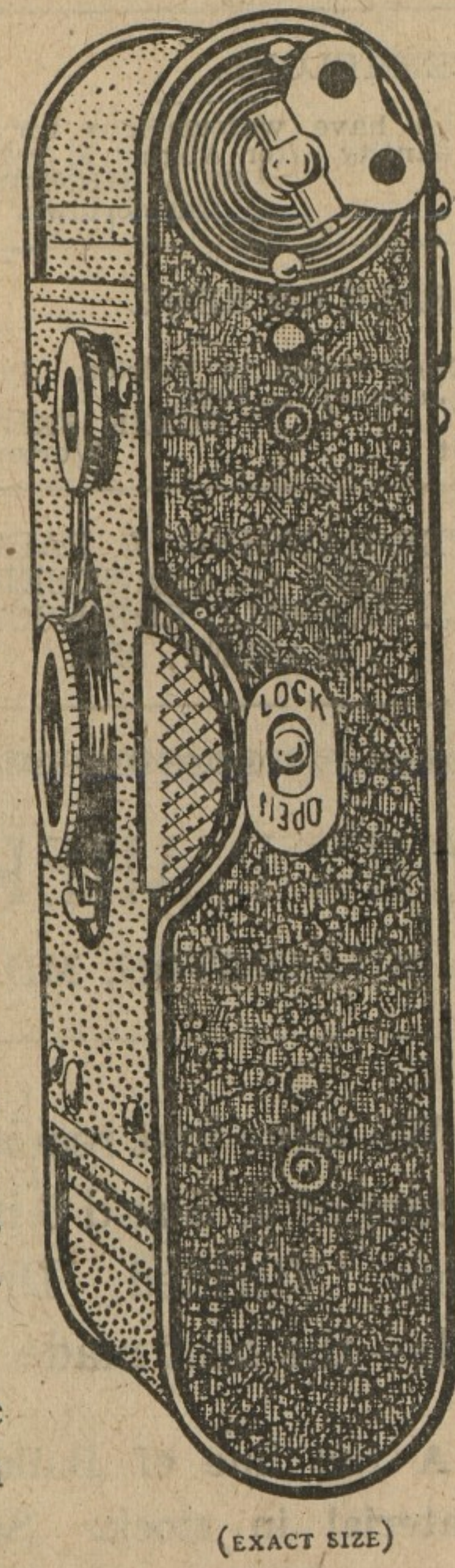

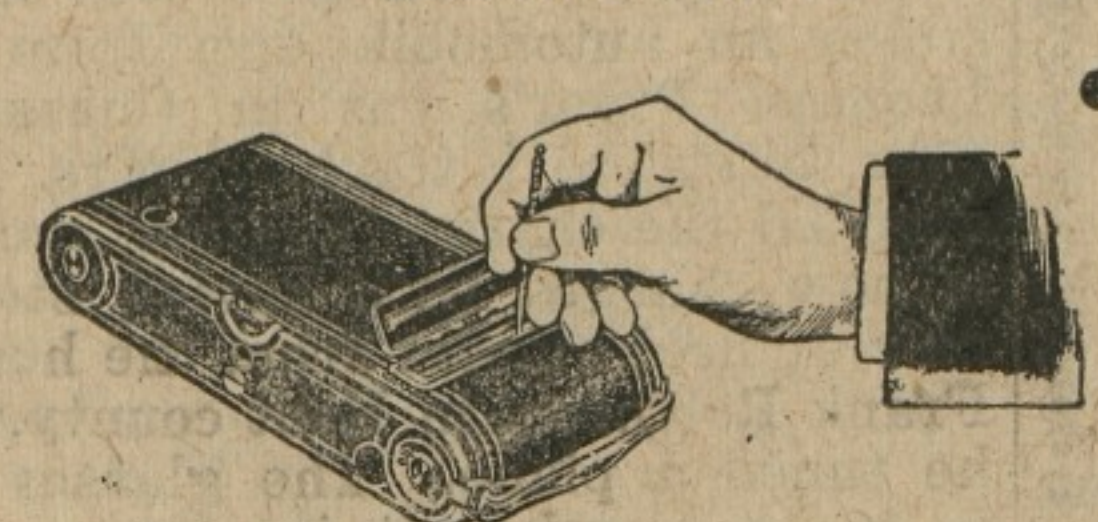

MISHAP THRILLS CROWD AT MILITARY EXHIBIT

Private Is Carried 500 Feet Into Air, Dangling By Strap, At Guard Demonstration—Carey Jarman Pulls Him In.

Private Percy Sunday, of Thurmont, hoisted 500 feet in the air, dangling by his canteen from the outside of a dirigible; and the sight of Maryland's new First Regiment passing in review "Governor's Day" at Saunders Range last week one of the most thrilling military events in Maryland since the war.

It was in the morning when the big dirigible C-2, from Langley Field, came swimming over the First Regiment's camp and sank to rest in a big field behind the rows of tents. Major Pagelow was in command.

"I'll take some of the officers up if you like," Major Pagelow told Col. D. John Markey, commander of the First and several officers clambered into the basket. A bunch of enlisted men were detailed to hold the basket down, with orders to give it a lift upward when the C-2 was ready to take the skies again. In the bunch was Private Percy Sunday, of Company A.

"All ready," called Major Pagelow finally. The enlisted men heaved, the big blimp's nose pointed upward, the basket began clearing the ground. All the enlisted men jumped away, waving hats and a cheer. The cheer froze in their throats.

For there, on the outside of the basket, with his feet already clear of the ground, struggling frantically with something at his belt, hung Private Sunday. He was going up. A rope had twisted around his canteen.

The crowd watched the sudden little drama speechlessly. Seven officers were in the basket and none of them seemed to have noticed Private Sunday at all. Major Carey Jarman, ordnance officer of the Maryland Brigade, happened to look around and was dumfounded to see a buck pri-

vate's head sticking up from the outside, 200 feet in the air.

Sunday had had presence of mind enough to hook his right arm over the edge of the basket and was feeling pretty safe, he said later. But from the ground it looked as though he might drop any minute. The blimp went higher—300, 400, 500—and finally the sight from below was of Major Jarman and Captain Barriek, Sunday's company commander, reaching out for him.

It was a hard struggle to get him inside, 500 feet in the air, with the basket swaying and the balloons mounting higher every minute. But they got him aboard at last, white-faced and almost breathless. And Private Sunday was the only "buck" in the regiment to get a real balloon ride.

Mrs. John Holden, of near Chestertown, met with quite a loss Friday night of last week, when a fox killed thirty of her flock of forty-five turkeys. Mr. Holden has been on the lookout each night for the return of Sir Reynard, but so far he has not ventured back. The turkeys had arrived at an age when there is practically no danger of loss from diseases that usually attack younger turkeys, and Mrs. Holden's loss may conservatively be estimated from \$75 to \$85.

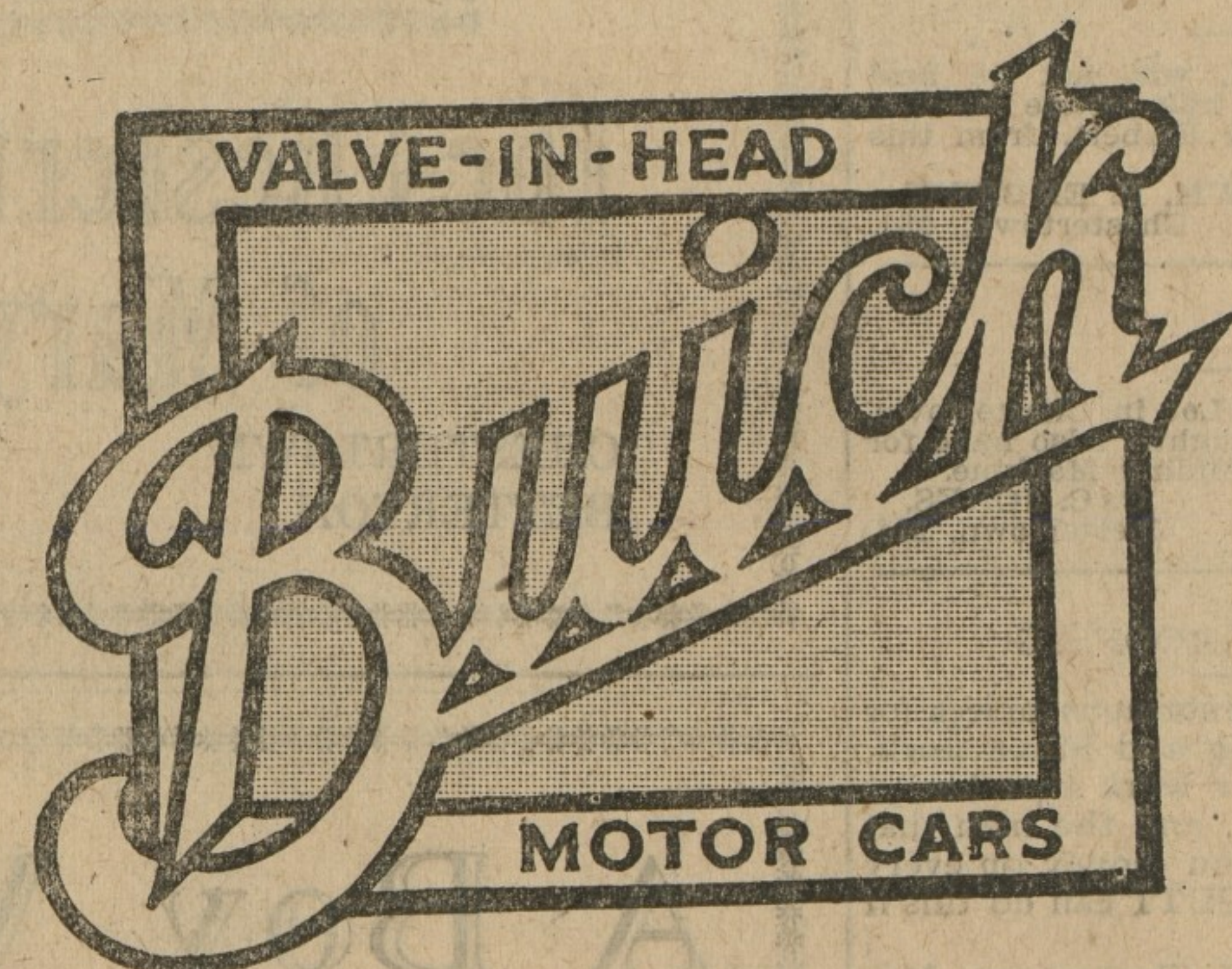

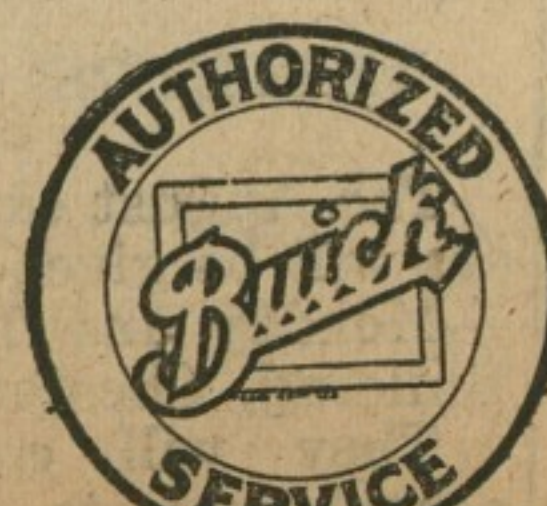
