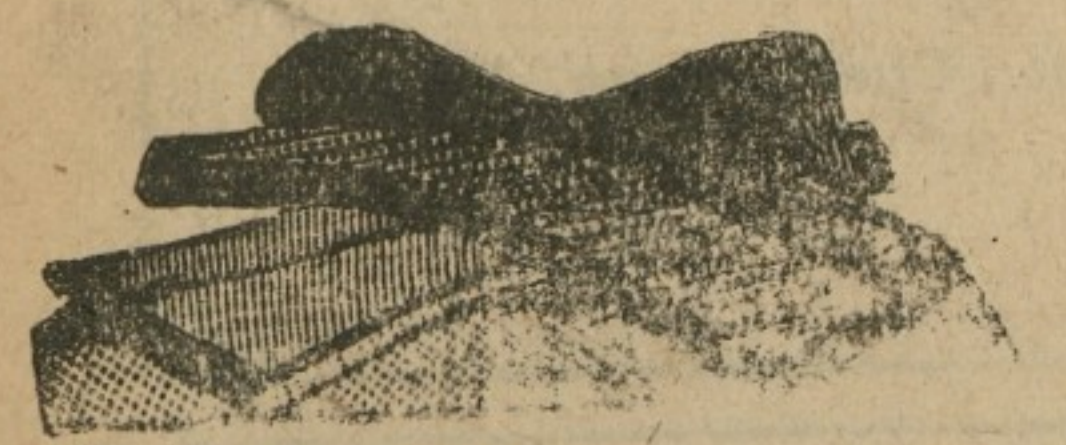
MILLINGTON

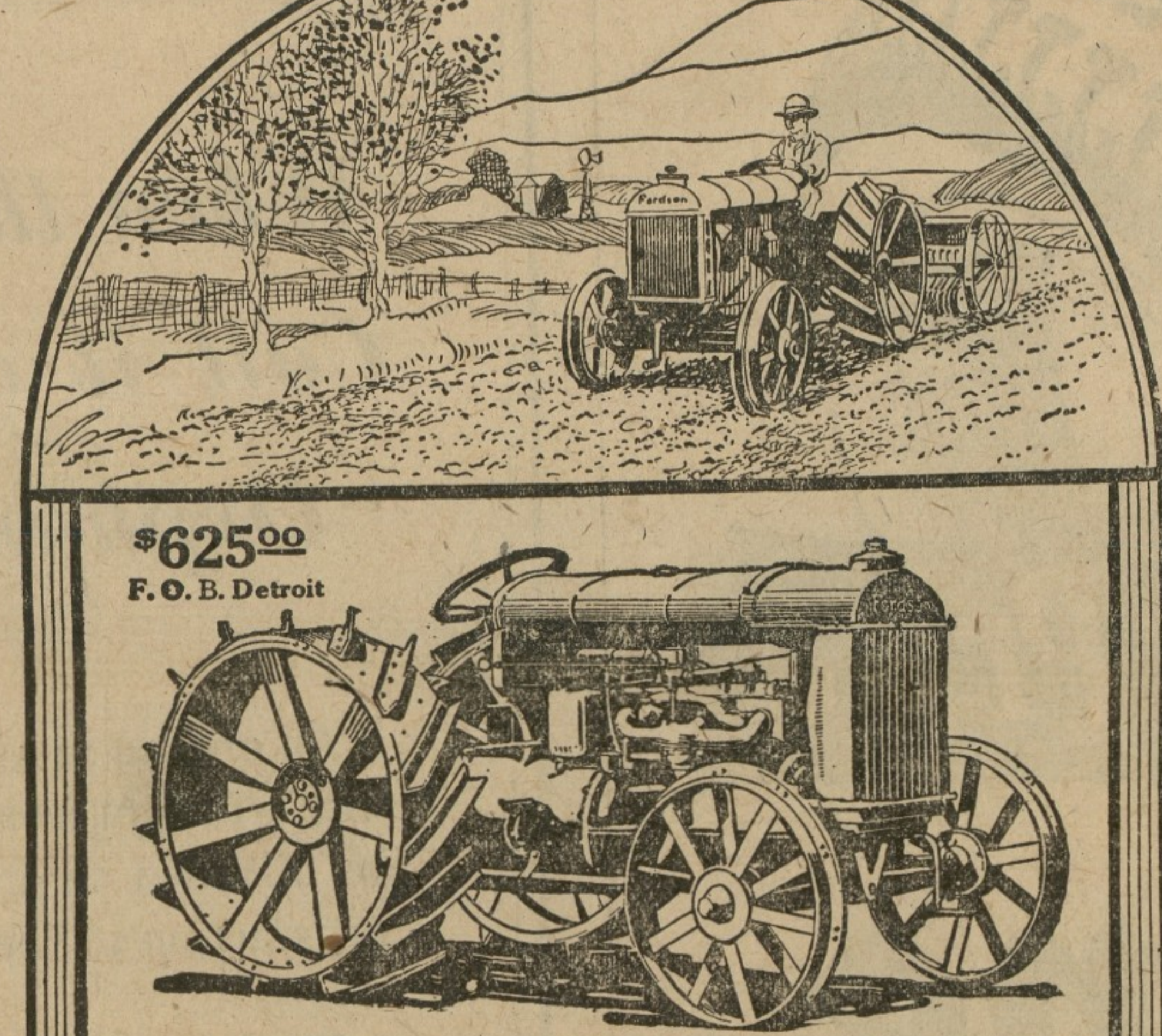
