The new department of commerce and finance is proving popular. The college is offering typewriting, shorthand and bookkeeping in the preparatory department and business administration and other courses in business in the college.

Killed by Gas Leak

Roy Garland, who recently moved here with his family from Wilmington, was found dead in the pantry of his home on Washington avenue, next door to J. N. Bennett and A. L. Sterling shortly after six o'clock.

Dr. H. P. Copeland was hastily summoned, and found that death had been caused by asphyxiation, the pantry being so full of gas from a leaking gas pipe that the physician said that if a lamp or lighted match had been carried inside the whole house would have been blown up.

Mr. Garland moved here about three months ago from Millington and was engaged as a welder in the automobile garage of Thomas R. Starr, in Pomona, a village about 20 miles from town. He was an industrious citizen and often walked to his work. He was about 40 years old and leaves a widow and four children.

Funeral was held Wednesday at 10 o'clock, interment in Chester cemetery, Rev. Omar E. Jones officiating. Mrs. Garland is a daughter of Mr. Dishong, of Worton.
