MAIN'S SHOW RETURNS TO WINTERQUARTERS

The Walter L. Main Shows, after a most successful season on the road, returned to Havre de Grace on Saturday, and after giving two splendid performances in the afternoon and went into winter quarters in Mr. Downie's building near the baseball

The show did not return, however, without a saddened heart by many of the showmen, and particularly Governor Downie himself, for "Chief," one of his prize elephants, and said to be the best trained elephant in the country, died shortly before the train pulled into Havre de Grace.

The elephant became ill on the way to Chestertown, and while everything was done to save him, the big fellow died before reaching Havre de Grace.

While the veterinarians were work-) ing on "Chief," his owner, with his hand on the elephant's shoulder, said, "Chief, old fellow, what is the matter?" The elephant placed his trunk over the shoulder of Mr. Downie and kept it there, as much as to say, Please do something for me." All the way to Havre de Grace, the

two mates, Louie and Babe, stood watch over their dead companion, and because of "Chief"s" death they could not be used in the performance here. When Mr. Downie was talking of his loss to the editor, on , Monday, tears trickled down his cheeks when he said he felt the death of "Chief" as if it were one of his family. Miss Dottie Bates, who had worked with the elephant for the past few years, cried as if her heart would break when she was told the elephant was dead. The elephant weighed four tons and was valued at \$5,000, with no insurance.

A taxidermsit, of Philadelphia, arrived Monday afternoon, and after removing the head and skinning the carcas for mounting, cut up the flesh and buried it on one of the nearby The show opened in Havre de Grace

on April 16, and traversed 6,611 miles, and showed in 11 States. QUEEN ANNES COUNTY MOURNS WAR BABIES


