A TERRIFIC EXPLOSION

The occupants of buildings near the Chestertown Depot were alarmed Saturday morning when an explosion occurred in Jones & Satterfield's shops knocking in window panes clear out into the road and causing a general stampede among the workmen there.

While at work at the forge on an automobile pipe which had evidently become clogged or filled with gas or oil, Walter Wright, owner of the pipe, and Edward M. Newnam, blacksmith, were severely burned about the face by the explosion of the accumulated gas in the pipe. Newsome, another employe, was slightly hurt in the back by a part of the pipe striking him. Mr. Wright received the cinders in his eyes and for a while it was thought serious damage was done. Mr. Newnam's glasses saved his eyes. The men were brought to Dr. Copeland, who soon dressed their wounds. A nurse from Easton was gotten for Mr. Wright and he is now convalescent and no serious injury is apprehended.

NEW OFFICIALS TAKE CHARGE

Hon. Lewin W. Wickes administered the oath of office to Clerk of the Court Robert R. Ayres at 9 a. m., Thursday morning and he assumed charge at once. Thomas Dixon, a former deputy, will serve for a few months to teach Mr. Ayres some of the duties of the office. Mrs. Don Falls will remain in the office to finish some work for Ex-Clerk A. P. Rasin.

Sheriff J. Thomas Hadaway took possession of the jail and named Leon Walbert, son of James E. Walbert, as deputy. Mr. Pinder had been selected but he declined to accept at the last moment. Chas. L. Gill, of Chestertown, and Adolphus Davis, of Millington, were also sworn in as deputy sheriffs.

Register of Wills S. G. Caldwell will retain Miss Cora Robinson as deputy for the present, but later he expects his daughter to take charge of the office.

Jesse H. Usilton, county commissioner, will take his seat in the Board at its next meeting.

Treasurer Wilson will qualify in April.

MEETING OF OYSTERMEN

Harrison W. Vickers, Esq., Chairman of the Conservation Commission, presided at an important meeting of oystermen at Rock Hall Saturday evening. Various opinions were expressed by the expert watermen and it was finally decided by vote that legislation should be passed allowing the use of patent tongs on Swan Point Bar.

For several years past this bar has been practically idle, because a peculiar disease had affected the growth of and in many instances completely killed the oysters. It is the purpose of the State Conservation Commission to secure some legislation which will permit of restocking the bar and if possible to get rid of the cause of the disease among the oysters. It was also agreed that the season for oystering should be postponed to Sept. 15.

Senator Wm. F. Russell was present and was an interested listener.

BIG SALE OF HOGS

J. W. Funk, Harvey L. Cooper and F. C. Wood inaugurated a sale of thoroughbred hogs in Kent at their farm, near Rock Hall, which proved a great success. These sales will become an annual affair. Col. C. E. Bate, of Kempton, Ill., and H. Stockton Start, of Kent, were the auctioneers. A splendid crowd of bidders were present and 68 head of boars, sows and gills were sold at an average of \$35.58 each. The highest sold for \$86.50. There were 23 sold to Kent county farmers, 8 to Hartford county farmers, one went to Oxford, Pa., others to Preston, Seaford, Salisbury, Middletown and elsewhere.

F. C. Wood is the tenant and herdsman and says he will have more and better ones next year. These hogs weighed from 40 to 300 pounds.
