## CONFERENCE NEXT WEEK

The News voices the sentiment of the people of Chestertown in welcoming to our midst next week that able and influential body of men which compose the Maryland Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church. We trust your stay with us will be pleasant and helpful and that your deliberations will be permeated with that sweet spirit which the conference symbolizes.

The opening session of the Annual Conference of the M. P. Church will be held in Christ M. P. Church, Chestertown, next Wednesday. The items in the morning program will be the roll call, memorial roll by Rev. J. F. Wooden and the Conference sermon by President A. Norman Ward, of Western Maryland College, after which will be the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The president will be assisted by D. W. Anstine, S. F. Casen, B. W. Kindley, H. W. D. Johnson, H. S. Johnson, C. M. Cullum, S. W. Coe and G. R. Donaldson. In the afternoon the president will read his report and the officers for the ensuing year will be elected. Pastors' roll call for the annual reports will take place also at this session. In the evening Rev. R. M. Andrews, D. D., president of the North Carolina Conference and Rev. J. Alfred Selby, D. D., president of the West Virginia Conference, will bring greetings from their respective Conferences. President Straughn presides.

Various reports will take precedence on Thursday morning. A communication will be read from Dr. Lewis, president of the General Conference, and the Conference will be addressed by Rev. Fred C. Klein, General Conference representative. In the evening there will be a report of the committee on evangelism, after which Rev. J. M. Gill, D. D., and Rev. E. D. Stone will make addresses on the result of the tent meetings held last summer.

On Friday morning and afternoon various committees will report in order. Friday evening the women of the Home and Foreign Missionary Societies will have charge of the service. On Saturday morning various committee reports and no sessions either in the afternoon or night of this day. On Sunday morning the ordination service will be held. Rev. T. O. Crouse, D. D., will make the prayer, and Rev. W. B. Judefind will preach the ordination sermon. His subject will be "The Pastor's Twofold Trust." After this the ordination service will be held, the president to be assisted by H. L. Elderdice, L. F. Warner, C. P. Nowlin, N. O. Gibson, E. D. Stone and G. I. Humphreys.

On Monday business will take precedence throughout the day, and in the evening the plan of appointments will be read by the president.

The Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies of the M. P. Conference will hold an informal conference in the Chestertown M. E. Church next Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Able lady speakers from out of town will make addresses. Public invited.

## HAND OF DEATH!

Dr. Louis E. Barrett. After a brave and courageous battle against the ravages of disease our friend and fellow-citizen, Rev. Louis E. Barrett, D. D., passed away at his home on Queen street early Saturday morning aged 79. He had been up town Thursday but upon returning home was taken ill and rapidly grew worse until the end came as stated.

Dr. Barrett was one of the most eloquent ministers in the Wilmington Conference. In early life he was engaged in the newspaper business in Easton. He felt called to the ministry, he said and from the time of his entry into the Wilmington Conference to the date of his retirement, several years ago, he filled many of the most important charges in the Conference, was district superintendent and throughout his entire ministry was in urgent demand.

He entered the ministry in 1876 at Epworth Church; 1878-89 Red Lion; 1880-81, Onancock; 1882-84, Still Pond; 1885-87, Port Deposit; 1888-91, St. Paul's; 1892-97, Presiding Elder, Wilmington District; 1898-00, Milford; 1901, Middletown; 1902-06, Dover; 1907-08, Elkton; 1909-15, Chestertown; 1916-18, Elkton. His seven years in this town was the longest of any other minister and when he retired he came to Chestertown where he became one of us honored and beloved.

Three years ago he married Miss Lydia Terrell, an accomplished lady of Elkton, and together they have enjoyed the esteem of everyone. The deceased, since retirement, has not enjoyed very good health but when able he has occupied his time filling nearby pulpits and delivering addresses at public gatherings. His last public utterance was at the Washington College, when he delivered a soul-stirring prayer which was commented upon in a letter from Judge Alton B. Parker and published in the News. Dr. Barrett's first wife died during his pastorate in Chestertown by whom he had one son, a physician living in Milford.

The funeral took place in the M. E. Church Tuesday morning, interment in Chester Cemetery. Addresses were made by Supt. Wise, Rev. Omar E. Jones and Dr. Geo. P. Jones, prayers were made by Supt. Mowbray and Rev. J. W. Prettyman, while scriptures were read by Rev. A. H. Covey and Rev. N. O. Gibson. A quartette consisting of Miss Hallie Toulson, Mrs. Polk Bramble, M. W. Thomas and John E. Barnes rendered "Jesus Lover of My Soul" and "Home of the Soul." The floral tributes were M. A. Toulson, W. T. Brown, W. B. Copper, Prof. Mark Cressy, P. Medford Brooks, J. D. Bacchus, H. B. Rote, M. E. Newsome, A. L. Sterling, Dr. H. G. Simpers. The honorary bearers were I. R. Leaverton, Col. Wm. J. Vannort, C. H. Jefferson, J. B. McIntire, John C. Davis, Thomas S. Borley, W. Irving Walker. At the grave the following officiated: Revs. J. A. Leach, J. M. Lindale, G. E. Sterling, T. C. Smoot and O. H. Connelly. C. L. Dodd, undertaker.

Death Of James T. Anthony. James T. Anthony died at the home of his son-in-law, James S. Kreeger on Water street, Tuesday night at 9:30 of paralysis of the heart, aged 73 years and 6 months. He had attended Conference at Cambridge and returned home feeling poorly. He went to bed Monday and his condition was never considered critical. He died without a struggle while his daughter was seated in the room thinking he was asleep. The deceased was born near Queen Anne, taught school at Salem and

afterward managed the estate of the late John A. Clough and later living on a farm near Chestertown. He was an ardent Prohibitionist being the candidate of that party for Congress in this District at one time. He was an indefatigable worker in the Grange and traveled all over the State organizing local granges. He was a citizen of high character, humble, industrious and esteemed throughout the town, county and State for his sterling worth.

Mr. Anthony is now the Chaplain and a member of the Executive Committee of the Maryland State Grange and will be much missed by all Grangers. He is survived by three sons and four daughters, namely: Randolph, of Ohio; Runsey and Townsend, of Chestertown; Mrs. English, of North Carolina; Mrs. Jester, of Alexandria, Va.; Mrs. J. S. Kreeger, of Chestertown, and Miss Estelle, of Washington. Funeral services were held Friday morning from the home of his son-in-law, J. S. Kreeger, the interment being at Hillsboro. Undertaker, W. T. Hicks.
