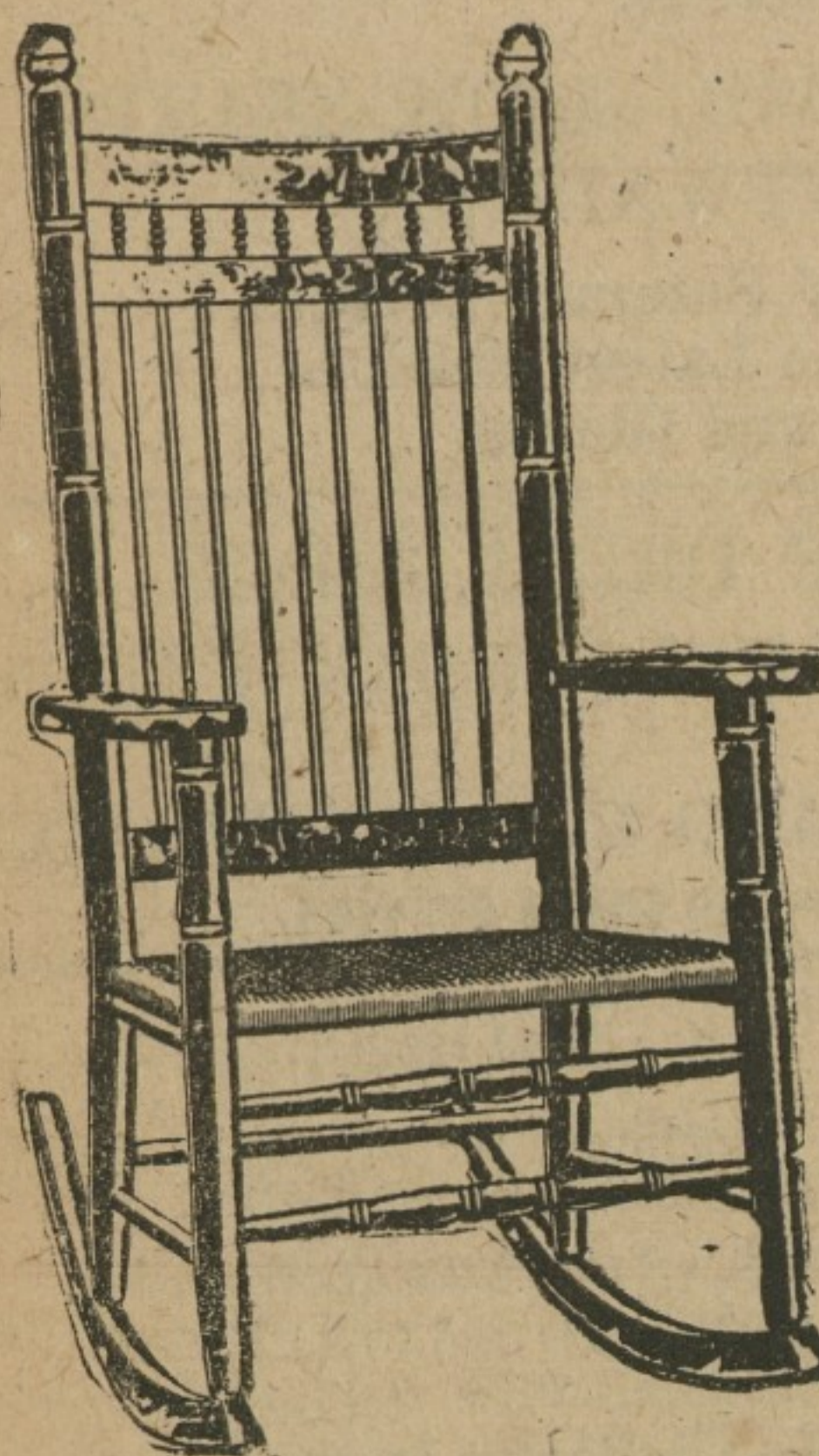

Rev. Avery Donovan, pastor of Dever M. P. Church, and his wife were guests of friends on his former charge, St. James, the past week.

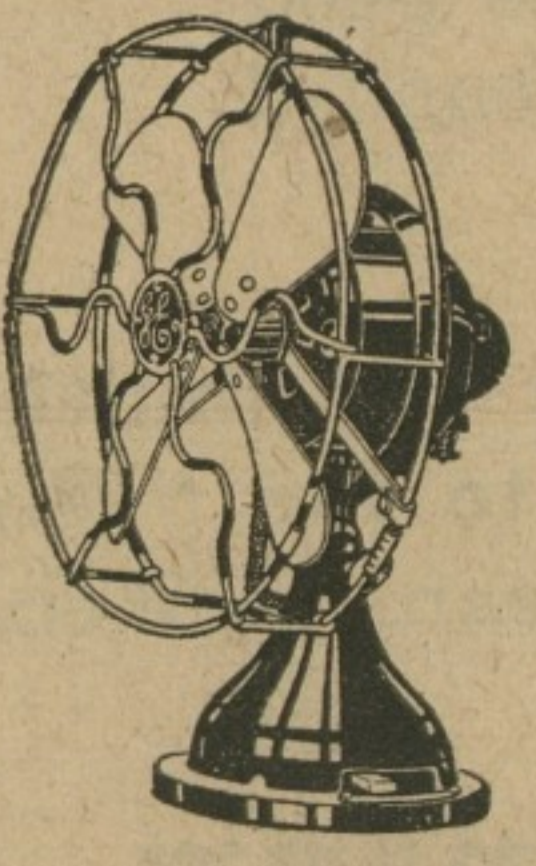
