

CAMP LIFE

The Sanitary Detachment, 1st Infantry, Md. N. G., left Chestertown on July 22nd, by local train for Edgewood Arsenal for two weeks of extensive training in the duties of a soldier.

When the boys arrived at Edgewood Station they found that it was raining but nothing daunted they at once fell into line of march and marched through a hard driving rain for three miles to the camp site and there was not a word of complaint from a man but they took it as being part of a soldier's life.

Upon arrival of the tents and other baggage, the men at once fell in and began to erect their sleeping tents, which was soon accomplished, and in a few hours what was before a vacant lot was turned into a tented city. At the call of taps the boys went to their cots and then began the first battle of the encampment. With the boys of other companies on one side and hordes of "sneakers" on the other, the battle was won at last by the boys with the help of mosquito bars or nets and citronella oil.

The next morning at first call of the bugle the boys fell into line to answer roll call and then to clean up and get mess or breakfast, which was followed by the march to the drill field where they were given instructions in marching and care of wounded men, together with lectures on sanitation of camps, etc.

posed of thirty-two men and four officers and they are furnished with clothing, transportation and food and are paid for each day in camp. Their work is to attend to the sanitary work of the First Infantry and care for the sick. They have a complete field hospital where about sixty men are treated daily. They have been commended very highly by all the officers of the camp, in regards to their work and soldierly manner, together with their willingness to try to become good, hard working soldiers of the good old U. S. A.

The Detachment is under command of Capt. Frank B. Hines, with Sergt. Olin Stafford as "Top-kicker", Sergt. Harvey Blyman in charge of the hospital with Pvt. 1st Class Leonard C. Needles as assistant. Pvt. 1st Class J. A. Blyman, is Company Clerk, and has charge of all the paper work, and Pvt. 1st Class Clifford Coleman, is Mess Sergeant and Cook, and every boy in the company claim him to be the best cook in the camp as every thing they have to eat is just like "Mother makes," and not a man comes out of the Mess Hall hungry. The boys are expecting to break camp Friday, August 4th, and will arrive in Chestertown August 5th.

Among those who have reported losses in the neighborhood of Ruthsburg are: W. H. Redden, 40 turkeys; E. P. Redden, about 20 turkeys; Fletcher Mandrell, entire flock of turkeys, nearly fifty; R. L. Skinner, several young goslings.

All of these farmers have lost a number of chickens and ducks. It is reported that they go to the barnyards in daylight and are in a hurry to make a get-away when discovered.

Hundreds Of Premiums For Women And Children Delaware State Fair Offers \$22 Prizes For Skill In Home Making.

Competition for prizes for needle work, crocheting, preserving and baking for the women and children of Delaware at the Delaware State Fair which opens at Elsmere on Lagor Day, September 4th and continues five days, it is expected will be keener than ever this year.

The committees in charge of this department of the Fair have made new classes to interest the competitors and enable them to show their skill more attractively than ever before.

With the women there are opportunities for 614 premiums, there being that many prizes for first and second winners offered. With the children there are 208 firsts and seconds whereby the kiddies may show their proficiency as future housekeepers par excellence.

Miss Denise duPont offers a gold medal to the child winning the largest number of blue ribbons in the sewing section, with no former winner eligible. Miss duPont also offers a gold medal for the best loaf of bread. Women and children may compete but professional bakers are barred. No former winner may compete.

In addition to the plain sewing knitting and crocheting, there are premiums for those women and children whose tastes run to fancy work in the way of china painting. There is also the opportunity for the professional needleworker and a special class for amateur and professional raisers of flowers to demonstrate their skill. The children have the chance to show their talent in drawing and painting and the crafts as well as the essential arts of the work of a home maker.

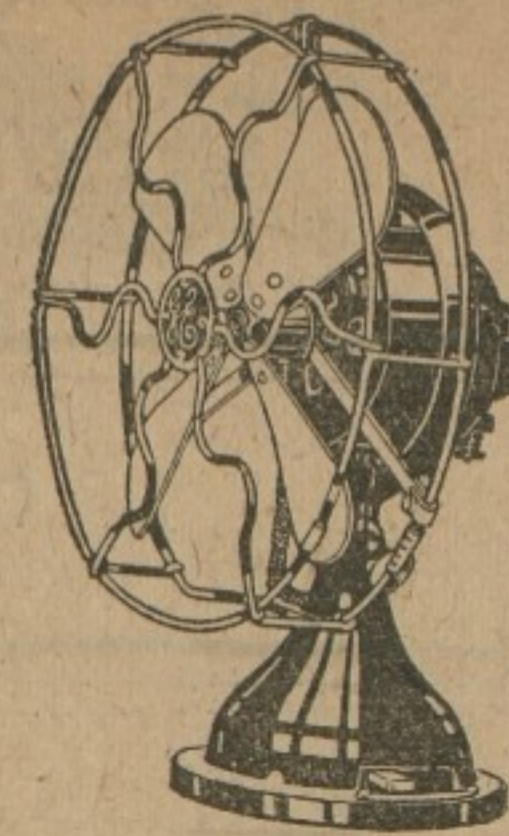
