BASE BALL NEWS

M. B. Thawley Made President of Shore League—Meeting At Salisbury Plans For Next Season—The League's Treasury Flushed and Dividends Of \$150 Paid To Each Club—Milford And Dover Complete Circuit, With Schedule Of 84 Games.

M. Brevoort Thawley, of Crisfield, was unanimously chosen President of the Eastern Shore League, at a meeting of 40 baseball officials held in Salisbury on Friday.

The resignation of Walter B. Miller, as President of the League, was tendered the officials and was accepted after Mr. Miller explained that the duties of the position were too great a strain upon him. C. Victor Matthews, of Cambridge, was re-elected treasurer, and the secretary will be chosen at a later date.

Applause greeted the report that there was in the league's coffers a balance on the right side of the ledger of \$1,750.00. A dividend of \$150 was then given to each of the six clubs.

Among the principal changes effected at this meeting was the granting of franchises in the league to Milford and Dover. These two clubs have been clamoring for berths for a long time and the fact that they have been admitted into the circuit is calculated to make the "baby minor" a stronger organization.

The playing schedule beginning next spring and ending Labor Day will be drawn up after Christmas and will include 84 games, an increase of 14 games.

One change that was made in the rules of league that will probably meet with no unfavorable comment is the one raising the salary limit of the players on any club from \$1,750 to \$2,000. This sum will include the manager's salary too, if he is a playing manager instead of a leader directing his charges from the dug-out bench.

\$75 is the guarantee that the visiting club will receive from the home team's treasury. In addition it will get a division of the general admission tickets after 10 per cent has been deducted for the league's expenses. In case of rain, the home manager will give the visiting club a rain check for \$40.

Eastern Shore fans will have an opportunity again next season to witness many of their favorite players in the various clubs of the Shore circuit in action. Almost 75 per cent of the names that appeared on the clubs rosters at the termination of the 1922 schedule have been included on the reserve lists forwarded to Secretary Farrell, of the National Association.

Of the possible 84, allowing the limit of 14 players to the club, reservations have been placed upon 62. Cambridge apparently intends to open the season with the same aggregation that wound up the past season in a whirlwind fashion by tallying 13 consecutive games in the win column. Laurel and Crisfield each retained 12 players; Salisbury 9; Parkley, 8, and Pocomoke, 7.

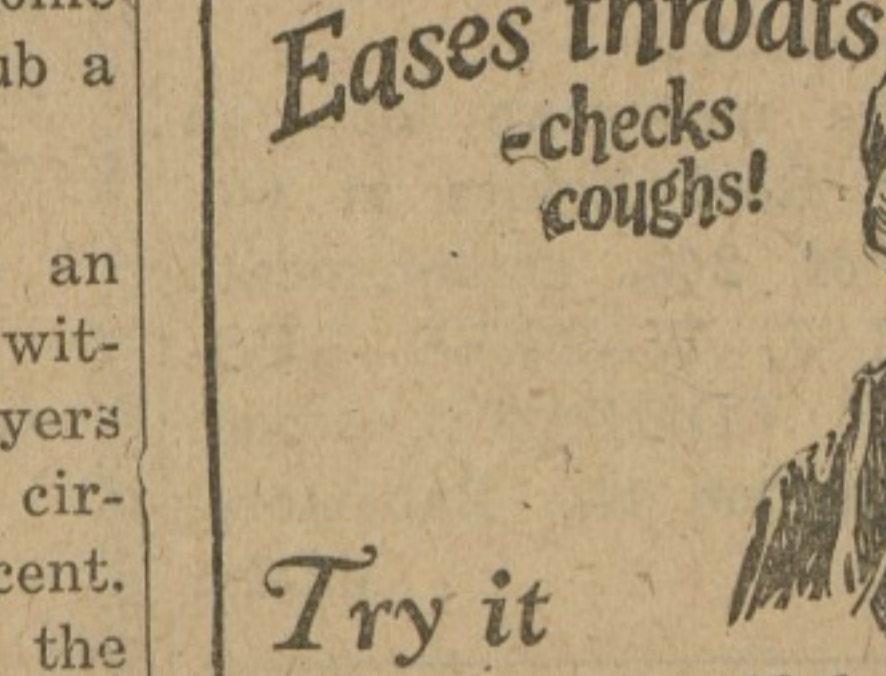

ORDER OF PUBLICATION

Frank Fallin vs. Mattie Fallin, in the Circuit Court for Kent County, State of Maryland.

In Equity. No. 2208.

The object of this suit is to procure a divorce "a vinculo matrimonii" in favor of the above named Frank Fallin, a resident of the State of Maryland, and against Mattie Fallin, a non resident.

The Bill of Complaint states that the above entitled Frank Fallin was married to the said Mattie Fallin on or about December 25th, 1902, at Atlantic City by the Rev. Edward Jones, a Minister of the Gospel of the Baptist Church and that said parties lived together until about the 20th day of April, 1912.

That the said Mattie Fallin, without just cause or reason abandoned and deserted the said Frank Fallin on said last named date and that said abandonment has continued uninterrupted to the present and is deliberate and final and the separation of the said parties beyond any reasonable hope or expectation of reconciliation.

That the said Mattie Fallin is a non-resident of the State of Maryland, but supposed to be a resident of the State of New York, but her exact place of residence is unknown.

It is thereupon on this 23rd day of November A. D. 1922, ordered by the Circuit Court for Kent County, Maryland, in Equity, that the Complainant by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some newspaper published in said Kent county once in each of four successive weeks before the 25th day of December A.
