We would have to work as well as preach, and I am more convinced than ever that the industrial department of education among barbarous nations is essential. The large majority of our workers in Africa are fresh from farms and workshops of our country. The Bishop, in concluding, said that the most of his money came from individuals in this country and in England who had faith in his work. He said he had a committee because he wanted the co-operation of responsible Methodist men and women who voluntarily gave their services without pay; they were incorporated for the same reason that trustees of churches are incorporated. "I am working officially and with a will to plant Methodist churches far and wide and my most disinterested committee of men and women are helping me because they want to do so and because their Methodist loyalty and heroic sympathy bind them to do it. If it shall be the pleasure of this General Conference to adopt the Transit and Building Fund Society, with its constitution and workers, then they will constitute a part of our regular system, amenable to the General Conference. The question is asked, 'Why not work under the missionary committee?' I answer, 'My methods are so diverse from theirs that the two can't be mixed up in the same office any more than can a coal yard and a milliner's shop." [Great laughter.] He said he preferred freedom at the front led by the God of missions to being under the command of good men 9,000 miles from the scene of action. The source of the family water supply is too frequently in close proximity to the hog pen, privy and stable yard. The slops from the kitchen are in many instances thrown on the ground around the pump, only to filter through and leak into the well. The remedy for this is plain and easy, and should receive the attention of all householders.
