In "protected" Germany carpenters, for example, get \$4 18 per week; in protected France \$5 42; in unprotected England \$8 25. If wages are higher here than elsewhere, it is because our labor produces more in a given time than any other. It is shown in the most conclusive manner that if there is one man our high tariff plunders more thoroughly than another, it is the wage-earner.

The Pope Means It.

The Pope repeats that he meant every word of his recent condemnation of the plan of campaign and boycotting in Ireland. In a new encyclical letter, which was read in all the Catholic churches of the diocese of Dublin on Sunday, he says that he has heard with regret that "excited meetings have been held at which inconsiderate and dangerous opinions regarding the recent Papal decree have been uttered, even the authority of the decree itself being unspared." As to the assumption that the Pope was proceeding upon insufficient information the report says: The Pope states that the decree was bas

ed upon the most complete information; that previous to its issuance he held interviews with Irish bishops on the subject and sent a tried and trusted legate to Ireland to inquire into and report on the true condition of affairs. His holiness reiterates his affection for the Irish people, and says he has always urged them to keep within the bounds of justice and right. He refers to a communication to Cardinal McCabe in 1881, adding: "As the people were led on with gradually increasing vehemence in the pursuit of their desires, and as there were not wanting those who daily fan the flame, the decree became a necessity." 

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
