And be it enacted, That each of the said officers of registration shall have in addition to the other powers conferred hereafter conferred upon him by law, during the respective times of his appointed sittings, under the provisions of this Act, the powers of a Justice of the Peace to pre-serve order and enforce obedience to his registration—to keep the access to such place open and unobstructed, to prevent tion, tending to intimidation, or to the ob-struction of the work of registration, or of the revision of the registration, and to protect and keep safe the registries of voters or pool-books, hereinafter referred to, while in his custody and possession; he may com-pel the presence of witnesses before him. while sitting as an officer of registration,
