"MOORE" AT THE FAIR. The Racing-Hogs Fed With Spoons-Eight

Hundred Pounders. Since my last communication the great Interstate Fair at Trenton, N. J., has taken place. The fair grounds are located in this district and not over five miles distant from here. The weather was unusually fair, consequently the attendance was very large, as the previous fairs in this State were attended with considerable stormy weather. The opening day, Sept. 30, was favorable and well attended by near-by residents, Groceries, but the next four days brought large crowds from all the surrounding States. On the 3d of Oct. the admissions were over 40,000. To go through the exhibits would take too much time and space. The amount paid for premiums was \$25,000. The manufacturing interests of Trenton formed a conspicuous part, the various machinery being in motion and goods manufactured on the ALL AT LOWEST PRICES. spot, which was exceedingly interesting as well as instructive. The products of the farm were numerous and made a fine display. The exhibits of live stock far exceeded any I have seen and the handiwork of the ladies attracted much attention. 1 cannot give a description of all the agricul- April 27, 1889. tural, art and industrial products. The greatest attraction was the races and the thousands on the grand stand and an equal number pressing upon the ropes encircling the course showed the interest therein. The fastest trotting time made on the first day was 2.26½. Second day, pacing race for \$600, time, 2.26½. This was the day Peynaud made his fool-hardy jump from an elevation of over 150 feet from the DOORS, ground and was so seriously injured. Third day, trotting race for \$800, time, 2.261. On the fourth day, pacing race for \$800, time, 2.19\frac{1}{4}; also a trotting race for \$600, best time, 2.25. Fifth day produced some good horses but I have mislaid the score. The fair was pronounced a grand success.

Although there were many enormous hogs on exhibition at the fair, yet a few miles from here can be seen on two or three farms hogs far surpassing any on exthese farmers each season to gain the championship and win the cash prize offered. Your townsman, Mr. Samuel Vannort, visited these hog-growing farms with your correspondent a few years ago, and then we were amazed to see 30 or 40 hogs all in separate stalls with heads pillowed up with small boxes and their feed of cooked ground meal fed them with large spoons after they became unable to get upon their feet, and eyes so surrounded by fat that they could not see. The same course is now taken but the average of the hogs in weight is much

You may form some idea of the anticipated weight for this season's crop when informed that several of the hogs two months ago weighed over 800 pounds each and then they had not commenced what they call "fattening their hogs." This heavy pork is sold in Trenton to the packers and a large concourse of people are present on their arrival. Yes! O, now and then meet a two-legged hog, but they are not the average, for I am well pleased with the people here and receive their kindest

HOG CHOLERA VS. CHARCOAL.

Government's Duty.

For pigs and fattening hogs give anthra-

cite coal every few days. If this cannot be had, get Cumberland coal, and the next best is charcoal. These coals are one of the best correctives for a disordered system, and in a number of cases experimented on by several large feeders of pigs as well as ourselves, we have found that anthracite especially will stop the spread of cholera, even when it has gotten into the herd. Some years ago we lost some eighteen large fattening pigs, and by using anthracite freely the disease was stopped. Our pigs and sows have now the run of the woods, where they have free range and a variety of food, yet we feed coal freely, especially charcoal. We burn charcoal ourselves. It is a very easy matter to keep a quantity on hand. Make a good fire, and after it burns freely smother it with sods and a little water poured over it, and a large pile of coal can be had. Use it freely. The

approach of cholera can usually be noticed by the appearance of large red spots gradually turning into running sores back of the ears. Remove such animals from the rest, give small quantities of laxative food, and feed coal freely to the sick, as well as Sold by C. F. Stam, Druggist, Chestertown to the healthy animals. Those having the disease badly cannot be cured, and had better be at once killed and burnt. A real cholera-sick hog cannot be sold for meat without detection in the open market, as the at all, it would be by stealth, and then be made up into sausage. Pigs should have a Tonic, Alterative and wide range, and access to pure water, and cholera would be rare. Filth, impure water and exposure to intense heat during the summer will usually inocculate the animal with the disease germs which will cause the disease to manifest itself in the early fall. 




