"SEC. 2. That whenever any hotel-keeper, keeper of a boarding-house, superintendent, manager or yellow fever, typhus or typhoid fever, scarlet fever, diphtheria, leprosy or any other contagious or infections disease, the said owner, proprietor, manager or other person having charge shall immediately give notice thereof in writing to the health officer and place and residence of the person sick, the name of the disease, the name of the owner, proprietor or
