## TOMATO PRICES FOR COMING CROP SEASON

Tomato canners predict that contract price for 1924 will be about \$18 to \$20 a ton delivered at the factory.

This price about equals last year; many of last year's contracts were for \$15 and others \$20 per ton. Canners report that the market is rapidly cleaning up tomatoes. The acreage in South Jersey is about 30,000, of which 5000 acres are grown as an early crop.

There will be no increase in acreage unless the price is better than last year. The growers through their Tomato Co-operative Association are endeavoring to pool acreage and in this way dictate prices to the canners. The canners will fight such a move. It has been tried out in other years and the growers were not able to hold together.
