LEGISLATURE NEWS
The Governor's reception Wednesday evening was attended by over a thousand. Besides our representatives there were present William F. Russell and wife, Mrs. W. B. Copper and others.
Senator Copper conferred with John N. Mackall, chairman of the State Roads Commission, who says there is no possibility of the Chester river bridge being built in the near future.
Several ducking bills have been introduced by Kent's representatives.
Senator Cantwell, of Cecil, has offered a Bill for a reduction of pay of county commissioner from \$2,000 to \$1,000. He has also introduced another marriage bill.

Affecting the Eastern Shore are two bills introduced by the nine Eastern Shore Senators providing a loan of \$300,000 for the State Normal School at Salisbury and a loan of \$100,000 for Washington College at Chestertown provided the \$250,000 endowment is raised by July 1, 1927.

Washington was not in form last Friday night and lost to Mt. St. Mary's. They will play them again next Friday night in Baltimore.
Flashing an attack which literally swept their opponents off their feet and a defense which seemed well nigh impregnable, the State Collegiate Championship Washington College basketball team registered its second victory of the season over the Young Men's Hebrew Association at Carlin's Tuesday night, the score being 34 to 17.
Washington College won a fast game from Loyola College here Wednesday night, 28 to 17. It marked the second victory of the season for the Collegiate champs, who by virtue of their win eliminated the Baltimoreans from the race for the State title.

BILL TO PROHIBIT PURSE NETTING KILLED IN HOUSE

The bill to prohibit purse-netting by Kent county fishermen was killed Thursday night by the House after a four-hour debate, which began at noon and was resumed after a recess.

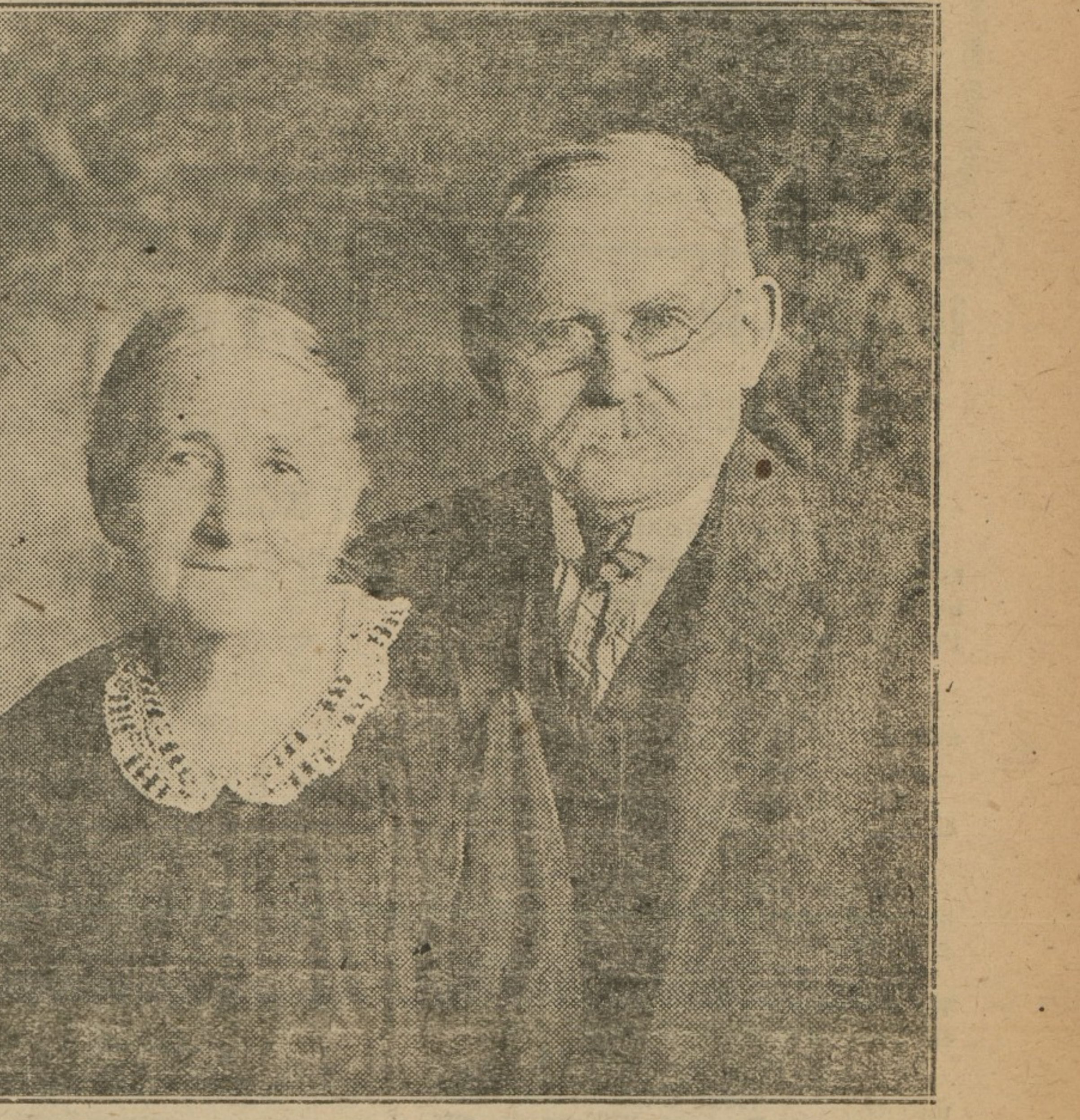
Although conservationists and sportsmen generally have indorse, the bill, the plea made on the floor by numerous speakers that the bill was "against the poor man," added to fraternal spirit among county delegates, led to the downfall of the measure by a vote of 71 to 34.

The legislature "climber" preventing its reconsideration, was applied by Delegate Coad, of St. Mary's county.

The action of the House upholds the position of Harrison W. Vickers, Conservation Commissioner, who at recent public hearing argued against the bill, but favored regulation of purse-netting. The argument was made tonight that no appreciable diminution in the supply of rock fish has resulted from purse-netting in the past 10 years.
