INSURANCE RATES REDUCED All Mercantile Risks Changed From 46 to 27 Cents Per Hundred - A Great Saving To The Residents Of Chestertown. As predicted in the Kent News, as a result of the improvements in the fire defenses, especially the recent purchase of a fire-fighting apparatus, the deficiency charge in insurance rates in Chestertown has been reduced from 46 cents to 27 cents. All specific rates on mercantile risks, except those of fire resistive construction or sprinklered, located under protection in town, and promulgated prior to April 16, 1924, are subject to reduction of 19 cents per \$100 of insurance per annum, which shall be deducted before the application of the percentage advances. Dwellings were reduced upon the erection of the stand-pipe some few years ago from a basic rate of 50 cents to 32 cents. This will mean a saving of thousands of dollars to merchants and others.

FACTS AS TO ROAD FUND! Pomona Grange in Session Saturday Protest to the County Commissioners as to Changing Plans for State Road in Piney Neck and Worton. COUNTY COMMISSIONERS MAKE STATEMENT Betterton, Md., April 28th, 1924. To the Honorable Commissioners of Kent County: The Kent County Pomona Grange, in meeting assembled, on Saturday, April 26th, 1924, moved and carried that a protest be made to the Commissioners of Kent County against the Tolchester Road being made before the Piney Neck and Worton roads, these being the roads that were to have been the next in order in construction. The Tolchester Road is now a good gravel road used mostly by tourists and will benefit but few residents of Kent County. There is at present a State road leading to the Rock Hall ferry which is but a few miles from the proposed ferry at Tolchester. The Piney Neck and Worton roads are needed by the tax payers of the county. Answer of County Commissioners. Chestertown, Md., April 29th, 1924. Mrs. Hannah L. Moore, Secretary Pomona Grange: Dear Mrs. Moore: Your letter in regard to Lateral and Post Roads received. In answer will state that the Board of County Commissioners at their regular session with all members present adopted this resolution on February 5th, 1924. Resolved, That what money not used for building the State roads from Chestertown to Pomona out of the Lateral Road fund of 1924 be stored toward building a State road from Coleman's Corner to Crosby's Store in Piney Neck, Fifth district. The Commissioners have neglected their farm work, as all three of them are what is now termed dirt farmers, and also made two trips to the State Road Commissioner in Baltimore, doing all in their power to have these roads builded, and have not given the Tolchester Road a thought, as a stone road, but did intend to regravell it in the near future. It is now and would have been the best dirt road in the county, and they are unanimous in their views that the Worton Road should be the next State road made after these two roads are completed.
