### CONVENIENT GEAR SHIFT ARRANGEMENT

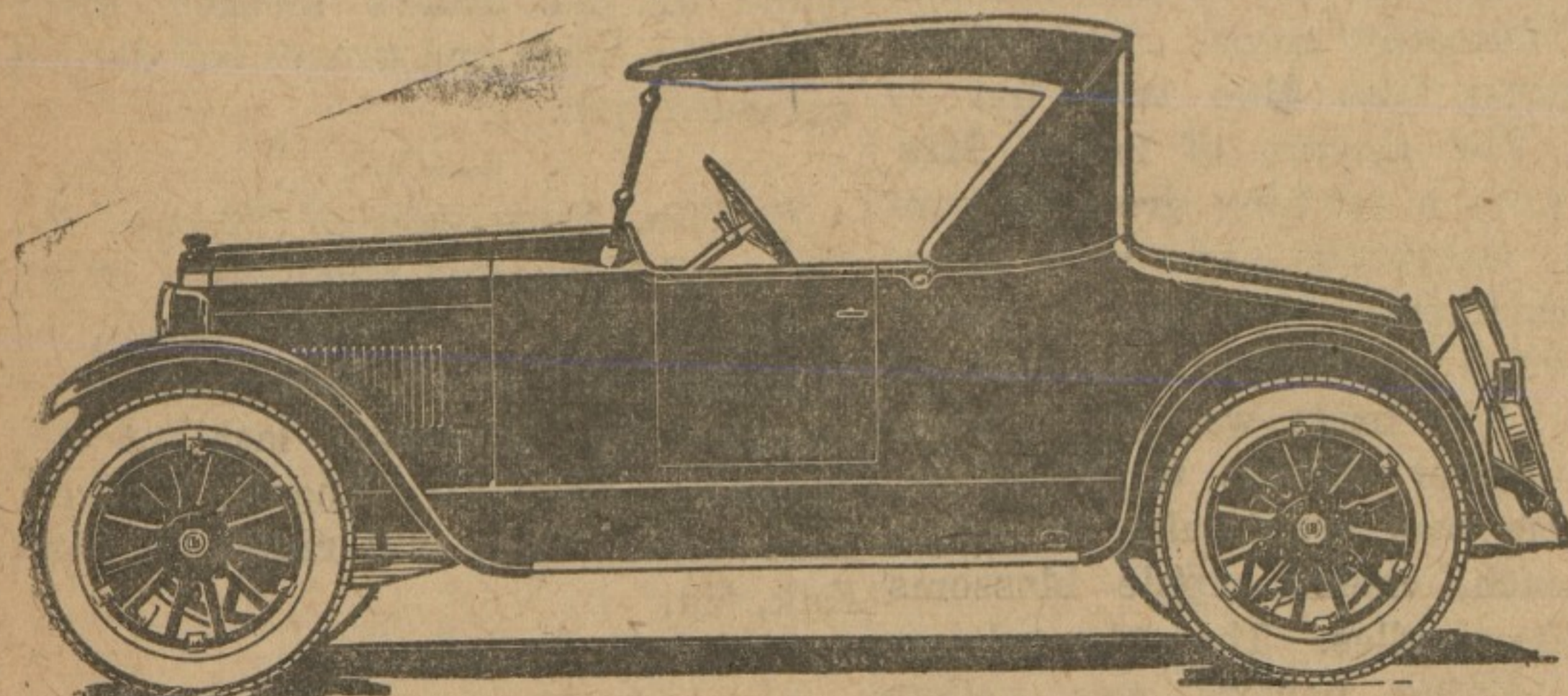
The hand gear shift lever has been moved forward, thus allowing easy access to the driver's seat. The throw of this lever has been shortened to facilitate easy gear shifting, while a strong spring prevents the lever from rattling on its seat. A lock built in the transmission locks the gears in the neutral position. This lock has been approved by the Underwriters' Laboratories.

### ATTRACTIVE STEERING WHEEL AND HAND CONTROL

The steering wheel is of moulded fibre construction and holds the spider firmly without the aid of screws. The spark and hand levers are shorter, conveniently located, and are retained by friction on a handsome nickel quadrant. The horn wire is now carried inside the steering column.

### ACCESSIBLE BRAKE CONTROL

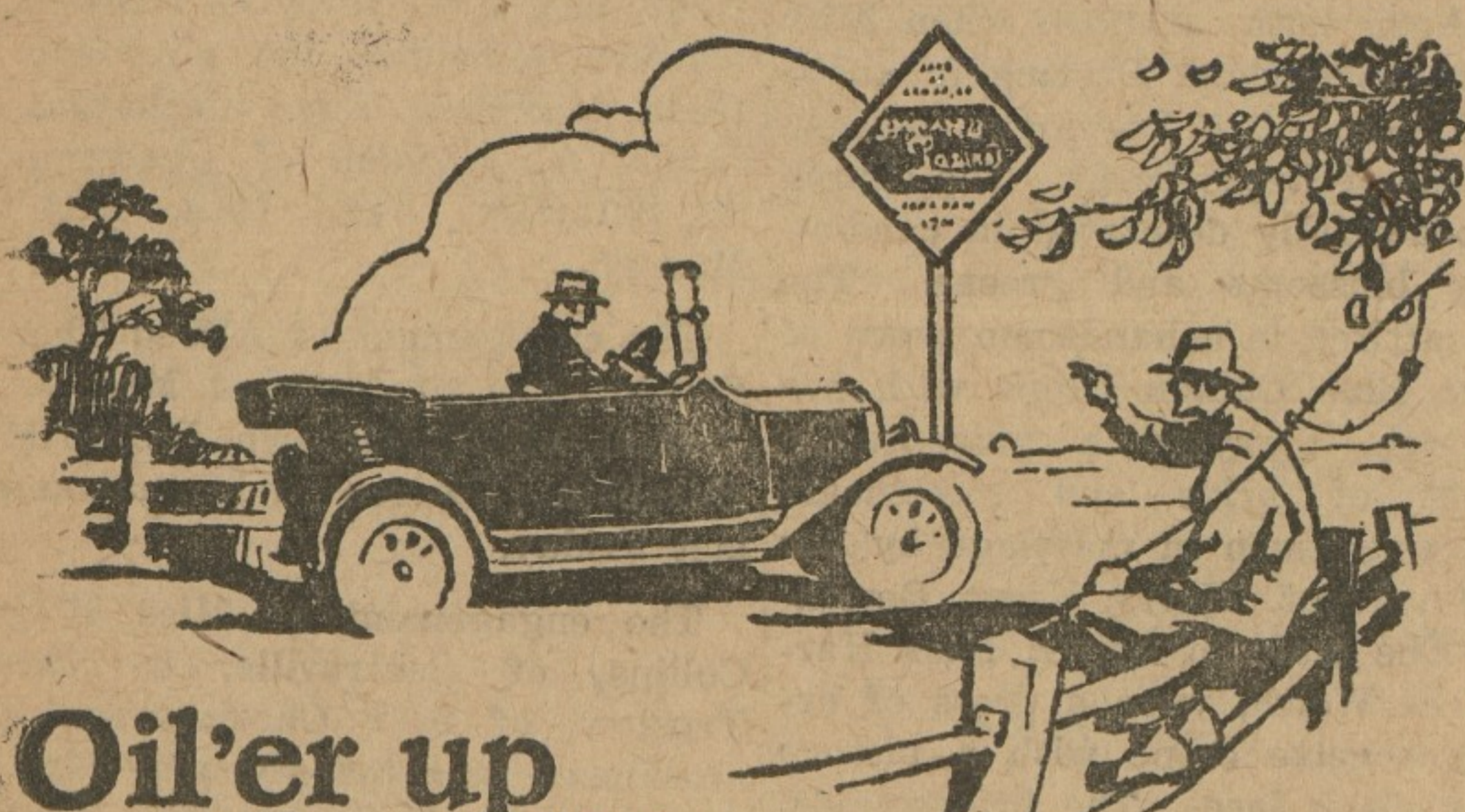
The hand brake lever has been moved forward out of the way in an easily reached position.

### FATALLY BURNED AT RIDGELY

Howard Betson, the 16-year-old son of Mrs. Ida Betson, lost his life in the fire which destroyed the large packing plant of Saulsbury Brothers, at Ridgely, on Thursday night about 12 o'clock. The factory, which was one of the most extensive on the Shore, was aflame in the rear when young Betson and several others entered by one of the windows for the purpose of opening the big front doors so the water could go through on the inside of the building. Betson's body was not recovered until the building was consumed.

The flames originated either in the garage, where several motor trucks were stored, or in the pea-viner house adjoining. The Saulsbury's will rush the work of rebuilding in order to take care of this season's pack.

The suit of Dr. Stevens against John S. McDaniel, which was removed from the Talbot court in Denton, has been settled, Mr. McDaniel paying \$250 and costs. Dr. Stevens has been a prominent practicing physician in Talbot county for many years. Mr. McDaniel is the secretary of the Emergency Hospital Board of Directors, and a State Senator.

### The Date Of Easter

Easter Sunday (Easter Day) is the first Sunday after the Paschal Full Moon—that is, the first Sunday after the ecclesiastical full moon, on or next after March 21, and, therefore, cannot be earlier than March 22 or later than April 25. If the Paschal Full Moon falls on a Sunday then Easter Day is the next Sunday. The Paschal Full Moon is the fourteenth day of a lunar month reckoned according to an ancient ecclesiastical computation and not the real or astronomical full moon. The date of Paschal Full Moon is established by an ancient ecclesiastical rule and is not always the same as the date of the astronomical full moon.

Three permits to operate motor busses have been granted to the Shore Transit Line, Inc., by the Public Service Commission. The routes over which the busses will operate are as follows: Goldsboro to Maryland, (this bus will continue through to Dover, Del.); Denton to Church Hill, via Greensboro and Goldsboro, and Claiborne to Fairbank, Talbot county, via McDaniel, Wittman and Sherwood.

## Maryland's Telephone Service

The service furnished by The Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company in the State of Maryland is at a higher point of efficiency than ever before in its history. There are a number of important things which go to make telephone service efficient. None may be slighted in providing a worth while service.

### Prompt Installation of Service

Orders to place telephones or to remove them to new locations are urgent orders. To complete them promptly means carrying spare facilities in all our central offices, spare wires in the cables, and large stocks of telephones and installation materials.

*Last year we installed 35,500 telephones and discontinued 25,500 telephones. Most installations are completed within a week. Only one in ten takes longer than ten days.*

### Keeping the System in Order

The telephone itself is a delicate instrument, but back of it is an equally complicated wire and switchboard plant composed of thousands of small parts, every one of which must be kept in perfect order. Much of the plant is out of doors, and however strongly built, is necessarily subject to disturbance from storms.

*Last year there was an average of only one case of trouble for each telephone in Maryland. Except for troubles arising from storm damage most of these were corrected in less than half a day.*

### Handling of the Calls

Our operators are carefully selected and thoroughly instructed. They work under the best possible conditions and the supervision given them is of the helpful sort. The whole operating force thinks in terms of seconds. Operators are only human, and while calls are generally answered promptly, with the thousands handled hourly there is a negligible percentage of error and delay.

*Maryland sends 800,000 telephone messages daily. Of these, 225,000 are crowded into the peak of the business day. But it is a twenty-four hour, three hundred sixty-five day service, and midnight finds the force just as alert as at noon.*

### The Telephone Directory

The telephone directory must be accurate. As each new issue closes printing and delivery must be expedited.

*To keep Maryland's directories up to date means adding and changing 135,000 listings yearly. Each issue for the State requires the printing and delivering of 192,000 directories. The last issues contained only 111 errors.*

### Development of the System

The extent to which the use of telephone service has grown can be measured by a simple test—think how seldom you make a call for someone and find that he has no telephone. Every year brings us nearer to having the telephone in every business place, home and farm.

*There are 162,500 telephones in the State of Maryland, a gain of 36 per cent in the past five years. Today there is one telephone for every nine people in the State.*

Telephone service is a matter of infinite detail and there will always be a small percentage of trouble which is unavoidable.

Where we fail it is not for want of trying and if our patrons will tell us frankly when troubles occur we shall be prompt to see that the proper remedies are applied.

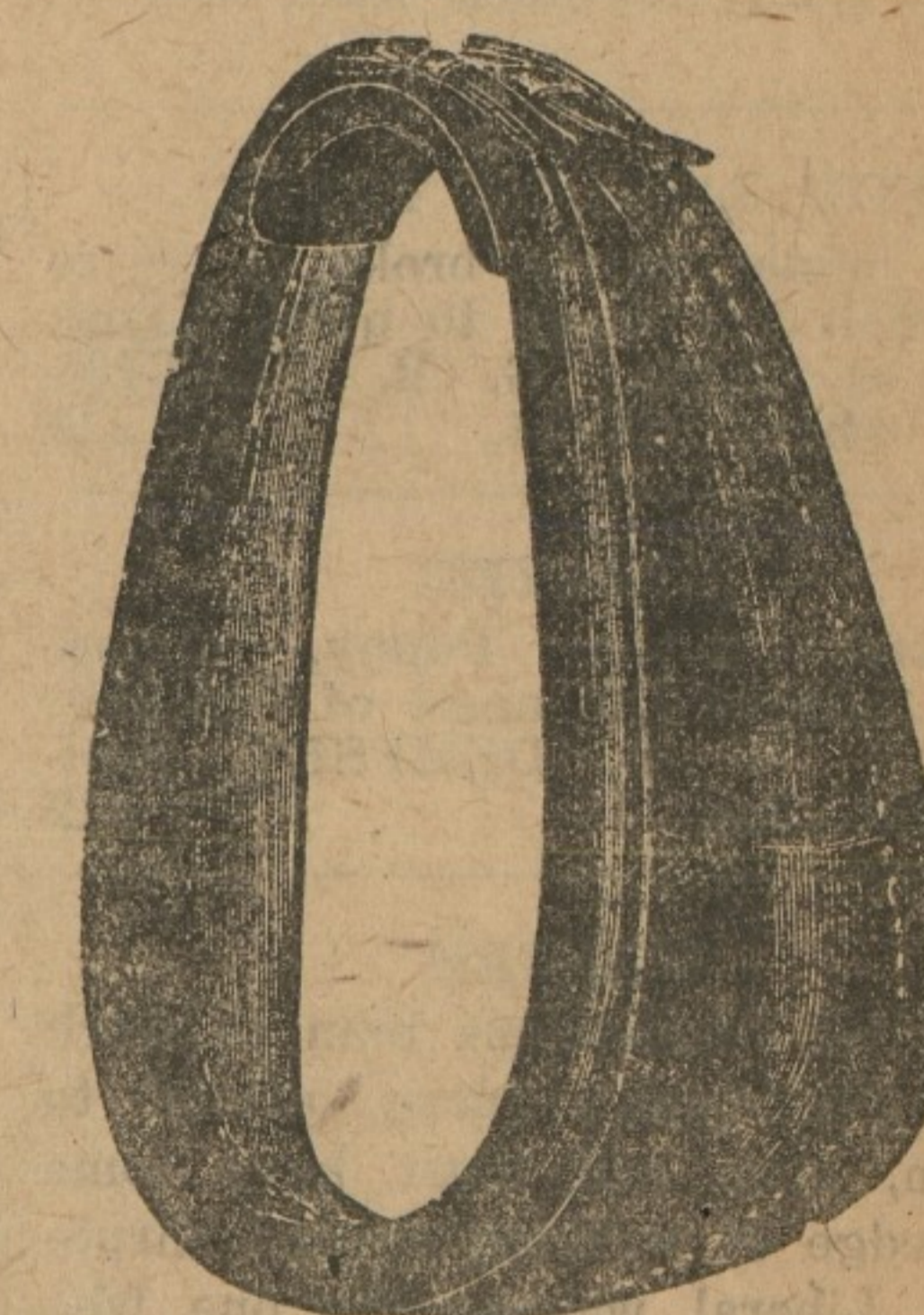

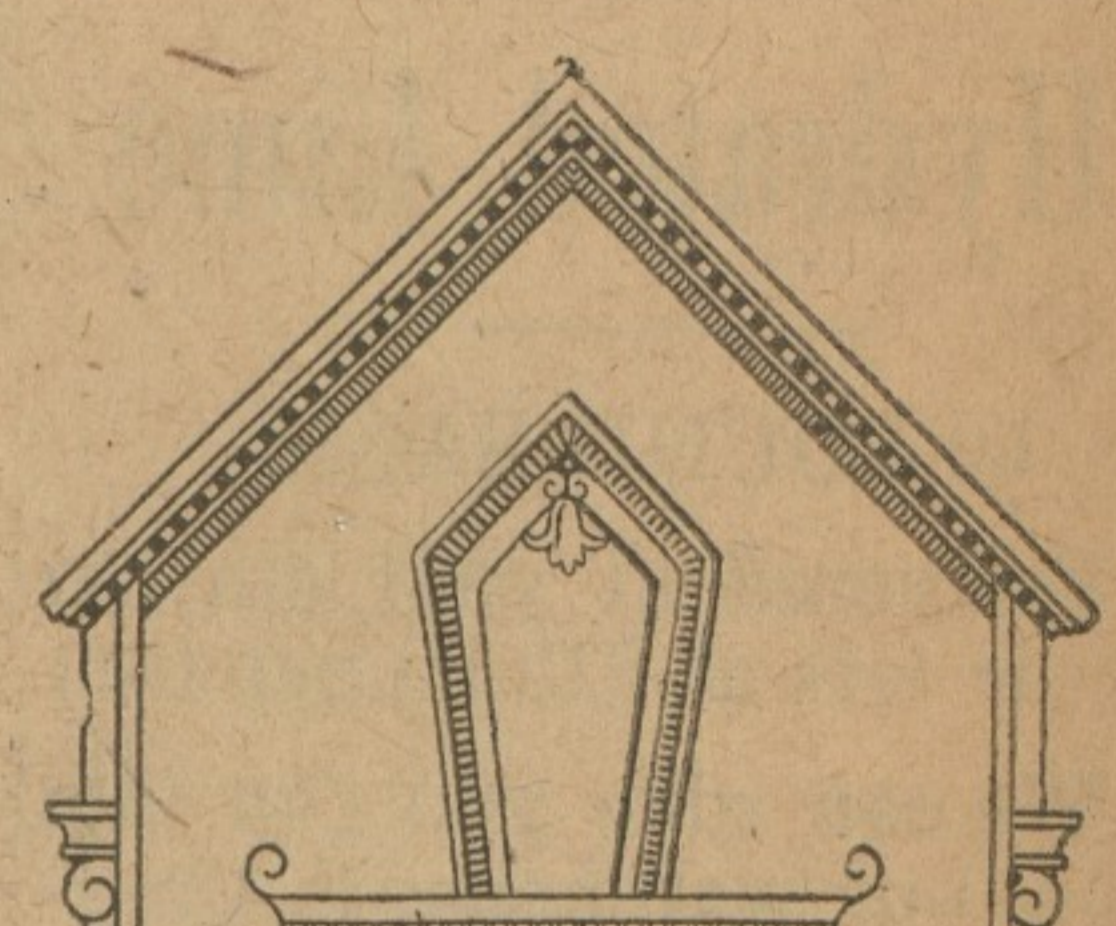

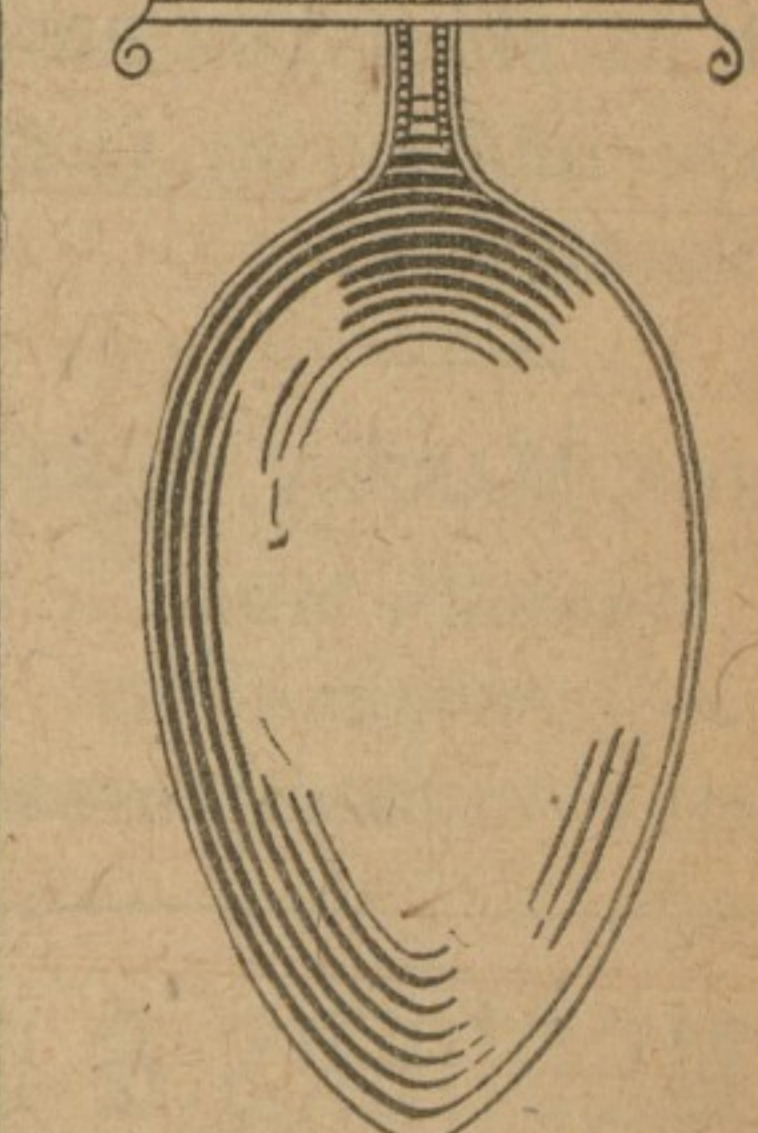
