Two Amendments On County Ballot At Fall Election

When Kent county voters march to the polls in November, they will find two amendments on the ballot.

A third amendment, that authorizing the city of Baltimore to increase the salaries of judges of its Supreme Bench, will not appear on the ballots until the next election for members of the General Assembly in 1926.

The two proposals to be voted on this autumn are the soldiers' bonus amendment and an amendment increasing the salaries of the State's Attorney, Deputy State's Attorney and Assistant State's Attorneys for Baltimore city.

The proposed soldiers' bonus amendment, survivor of a group of bonus measures introduced at the last Legislature, would remove the provision which now exists in the Constitution against granting of bonuses and pensions by the State and would empower the General Assembly to pass legislation looking to such appropriations, the legislation to become effective only upon approval by a majority of the voters.

In other words, a double referendum on the soldiers' bonus is proposed: (1) on the adoption of the Constitutional Amendment and (2) in the event of the amendment's adoption upon the adoption of the resulting appropriation measure or bond issue.

Salary Raises.

The second proposed amendment would revise upward as follows salaries in the State's Attorney's office of Baltimore city.

State's Attorney, from \$5,400 to \$7,500.

Deputy State's Attorney, from \$4,000 to \$5,000.

Assistant State's Attorney, from \$2,500 to \$4,000.

The amendment authorizing Baltimore city to use its discretion in increasing salaries of judges of the Supreme Bench was defeated at the polls in the last general elections.

At the ensuing session of the General Assembly another bill embodying the amendment was passed and it will be again submitted for the approval of the electorate.
