WILD DUCKS IN CHESTER RIVER OFF CHESTERTOWN

More wild ducks were feeding in Chester river during the past week than has been known in the history of the oldest gunners. It is believed the ducks are being driven into the river by the scarcity of food on the Susquehanna Flats, where it is said the wild celery which is the principal food of the wild ducks has become almost extinct because the greater part of it was killed last spring when deposited in a heavy sediment on the flats through which the celery has been unable to force a growth.
