HUGH WALLIS, OF KENT CO., LEAVES \$800,000
Hugh Wallis, Of Kent County Gave Liberally To Charities From Money Made In Capital Restaurant.
The romantic story of a one-time Kent county (Md.) farm boy who entered into business with savings of \$100 as his sole capital and built up a fortune of nearly \$1,000,000 is revealed in the will of Hugh Wallis, which has just been probated in Washington, D. C.
Wallis guarded his little nest-egg while he walked the streets of Washington seeking his opportunity, then when he opened a little restaurant in the National Capital he added to his savings hard work, grit and brains, as so many successful men have done, and when he died recently had become a well-known figure in the National Capital.
Some of his Kent county relatives will benefit under the will. To four cousins, children of the late Colin F. Stam, of Chestertown, he left \$500 each. Wallis' widow will receive an annual income of \$25,000 and many charities are named as beneficiaries.
As a boy, Wallis worked in the fields on a farm near Chestertown. But he felt that the city offered wider opportunities and a life more to his liking. Accordingly he struck out for Washington with his \$100 nest egg.
Wallis searched long through the streets looking for what would represent to him the door of opportunity. At last he found it—a vacant store which seemed to him a particularly advantageous location for a restaurant.
A friend who had been Wallis' constant companion agreed that he had chosen the right place. Wallis rented the store, equipped it in the meager fashion his tiny capital permitted and threw open the doors for business.
Despite his lack of experience his restaurant was a success from the start. Then Wallis studied the wants of his patrons, improved his service and equipment, and worked hard to build up his business. As he made more money he put more into his business, altered his mode of living and contributed to charities. An ardent Democrat, he also contributed \$5,000 to the fund of that party in the last Wilson campaign.
Wallis continued to save money as he had on the Kent county farm. Much of it went into well-selected investments. When the will was filed it showed that the little \$100 nest egg had grown to more than \$800,000.

Improved farm land sold for as low as forty cents an acre when eighteen pieces of private property were put up for public sale at Dover Saturday for non-support of county taxes. It was the first sale of its kind to be held in Kent county, Del., since 1895. The real estate, which had an assessed value of about \$12,000, brought in a total amount of \$849.50. CO-OPERATIVE CANNERIES READY FOR TOMATOES
The public will watch with interest the operations of the two co-operative canneries started in Kent county—one at Rock Hall and the other at Fairlee.
The cannery at Fairlee is one of the most modern in construction and up-to-date in equipment on the Peninsula. It was erected by The L. A. Pennington Construction Company, of Chestertown, and the materials furnished by E. S. Adkins Lumber Company. The site is on a knoll close to Fairlee and comprise three acres purchased of Wilbert Kendall. The main building is 40x80 with porch 30x132 on one side and another 28x70 on end. The absence of pillars or posts give freedom to the handling of machinery and tomatoes and is quite a new idea in the construction of canneries.
Two large sleeping quarters 16x80 feet with porches with cook houses 20x80 feet furnish adequate room for the 100 employees. This help has been engaged in Baltimore and will arrive about August 1st.
The boiler room has a 100 horsepower boiler which will furnish the power to drive the various labor-saving pieces of machinery. A Delco lighting plant will flood the cannery with light. A garage 16x20 will house the autos.
Upon our visit to this plant there were 16 men at work laying concrete floors and doing other work. The plant will cost complete about \$18,000 and will handle tomatoes from 250 acres.
Leonard A. Pennington, who conducted Baldwin's cannery at Kennedysville, for more than 30 years, has been employed as superintendent, and H. Stockton Startt, the treasurer of the company, will be in charge of the books, with his son, Skirven Startt, as assistant.
Wm. T. Nicholson is the president of the company. They have already received offers from brokers to finance the affair, to sell their pack etc., but no engagements have been made nor any futures sold.
The destruction of plants in the middle West by hailstorms and serious drought in many other sections of the country, it is believed, will be the means of boosting the price of tomatoes, and there is a fine prospect now throughout Kent county for a fair yield.
Many farmers have had to replant several times and the indication are for a late crop.

The gathering will be a notable one from the standpoint of Eastern Shore politics.
