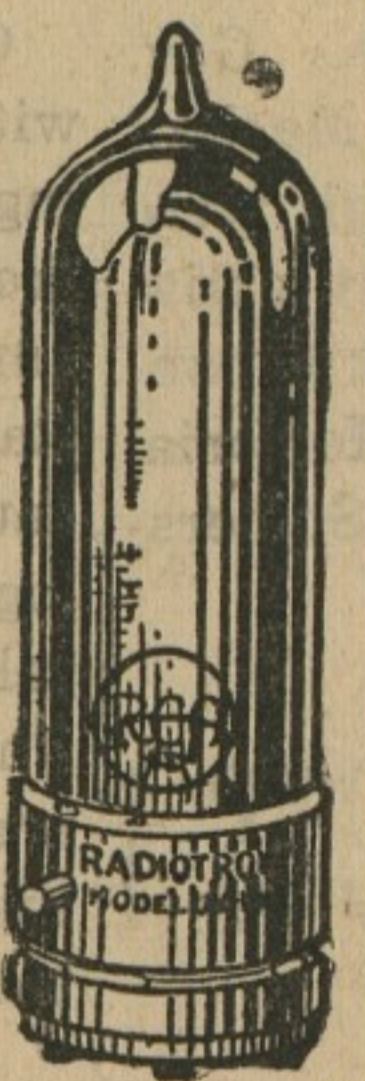

SUDDEN DEATH OF WILLIAM J. BRYAN

Dayton, Tenn., July 26—Shortly before William Jennings Bryan died today he remarked that he had never felt better in his life and was ready to go before the country to wage his battle against Modernism.

The Commoner had returned to Dayton this morning after completing arrangements for the publication of the address he had prepared to deliver in closing the trial of John T. Scopes, who recently was convicted of violating Tennessee's anti-evolution law.

Publication of this speech at an early date was to mark the opening of the crusade in behalf of fundamentalism, Mr. Bryan planned to carry before the entire country.

Despite the fact Mr. Bryan had spoken yesterday at Jasper and Winchester, Tenn., and had traveled over 200 miles, he appeared in the best of health and unfatigued. He attended services at the Southern Episcopal Church and which citizens of Dayton tonight described as one of the most beautiful ever delivered in the church.

Following the services, the Commoner was greeted by many members of the congregation. He then returned to his temporary home here, where he ate a heavy dinner, remarking that his travels of yesterday and the early morning had given him a hearty appetite.

Shortly after three o'clock Mr. Bryan retired to his room to rest and Mrs. Bryan went to the back porch to attend to some correspondence. She was only 15 feet away from his bed. Mrs. Bryan told friends.

"About 4.30 o'clock I felt like Mr. Bryan had been asleep long enough so I sent Mr. McCartney (the chauffeur) to wake him."

McCartney entered the room and shook Mr. Bryan. Later he said: "He always was a heavy sleeper and was hard to wake."

When he shook the body a second time he noticed Mr. Bryan was not breathing, McCartney explained.

Mr. W. F. Thompson and Dr. A. C. Broyles were summoned immediately and A. B. Andrews also was called by McCartney. After an examination the physicians stated Mr. Bryan evidently had been dead between thirty and forty-five minutes, and that death had been caused by apoplexy.

Mr. Andrews said: "During all the excitement Mrs. Bryan was the calmest person in the house. She took complete charge of affairs and showed more nerve than I have ever seen in a woman—and she is an invalid, too."

Several times, Mrs. Bryan said, the Commoner expressed a desire to be buried in Arlington Cemetery. She added: "You know he was a colonel in the Spanish-American War, and since it was his wish to rest in Arlington we will place him there."

Resume of William J. Bryan's Many Sided Activities.

A resume of the life of William Jennings Bryan follows:
Born in Salem, Ill., March 19, 1860, son of Silas Lillard Bryan and Mariah Elizabeth Jennings Bryan. Graduated from Illinois College in 1881 with highest honors.

Admitted to Illinois bar in 1883 and practiced at Jacksonville until 1887, when he moved to Lincoln, Neb.

Married Miss Mary Elizabeth Baird, of Perry, Ill., on October 1st, 1884.

Elected to Congress from First Nebraska district in 1891 and served until 1895.

Nominated by Democrats for the United States Senate in 1894, but was defeated by John M. Thurston.

Editor of the Omaha World-Herald from 1894 until 1896.

Delegate to Democratic national convention in 1896, wrote the "silver plank" and was nominated for the Presidency, but was defeated by William McKinley.

Raised a volunteer infantry in Nebraska for Spanish-American war in 1898 and became its colonel.

Again nominated for Presidency by Democrats in 1900 and again defeated by William McKinley.

Established "The Commoner," a weekly political paper, at Lincoln after the election and in 1906 made a tour of the world.

Received third nomination for the Presidency in 1908 and was defeated by William Howard Taft.

One of chief factors in nomination of Woodrow Wilson over Champ Clark in 1912 at Baltimore convention.

Secretary of State in Wilson Cabinet from 1913 to 1915, when he resigned because of difference with the President.

Delegate to Democratic convention in San Francisco in 1920, where he fought for dry plank in platform.

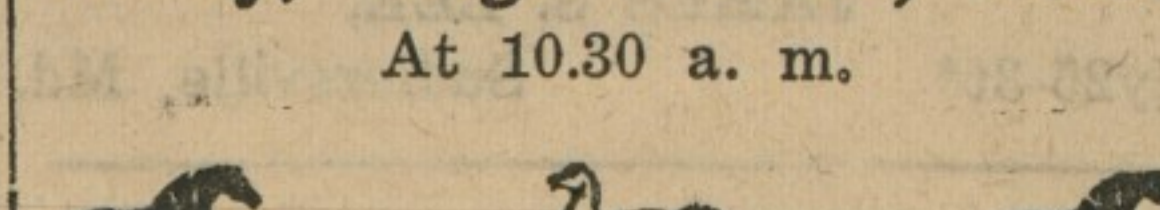
Delegate to the Democratic convention of 1924, from Florida and supported William G. McAdoo for Presidential nomination.

Aided prosecution of John Thomas Scopes at Dayton, Tenn., in July, 1925.

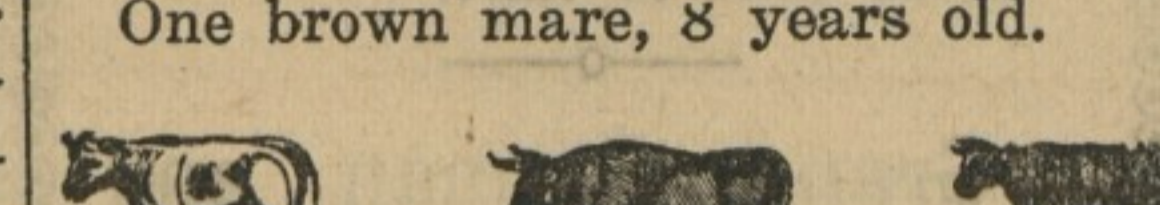

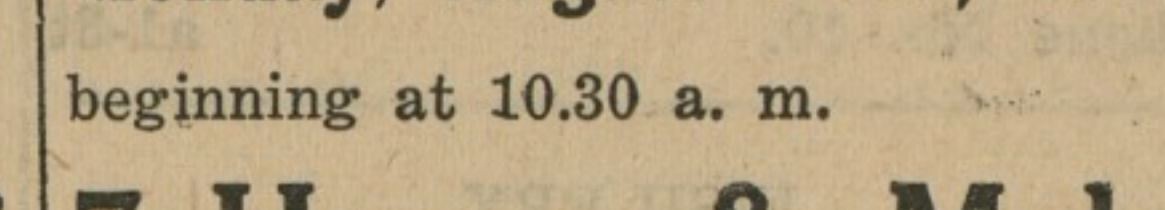

This is in error as there can be nothing north of such a line, the line itself running due north and south. This Department therefore expects to enforce the provisions of the law requiring the above mentioned fishermen to license and Captain Akers of the Local Police Boat has been instructed accordingly.
