DEATHS

Capt. Curtis T. Crane, died at his home here Monday, following a long illness of a complication of diseases. He was 72 years old. Capt. Crane was a native of Queen Anne's county, but in early life moved to Chestertown and with his brother were engaged in the carpeting business. He retired from the Baltimore business and moved to St. Michaels, Talbot county, where he resided for several years, and then moved to Chestertown where and his two nephews, William and Thomas Trenchard, organized and operated Chestertown Basket Factory. Mr. Crane later became the sole owner. Several years ago he sold control of the factory to the Marvel Package Company, retaining, however, a portion of the stock. For the last four years he had been retired from active pursuits. Mr. Crane was a prominent Democrat, having served a term in the Maryland House of Delegates and served as delegate to conventions on several occasions. He was a member of the board of visitors and governors of Washington College prior to its reorganization, was a member of the board of directors of the Chestertown Bank and a vestryman in Emmanuel P. E. Church. He is survived by a widow, who before marriage was a Miss Faithful Queen Anne's county, and an adopted daughter, Mrs. Earl Withgott, of Easton. Funeral service was held from his late home Wednesday morning at 8 o'clock, conducted by Rev. C. L. Atwater. His remains were then taken to Baltimore, where interment was made in Loudon Park Cemetery. The active pall bearers were: Eben F. Perkins, Allan A. Harris, J. D. Bachus, Wm. B. Usilton, S.
