**DAIRYMEN ASKING INCREASE**  
The directors of the Inter-State Milk Producers' Association were called to Philadelphia on Monday of last week. A resolution was passed asking for a price conference with the dealers.  
On Wednesday afternoon the conference was held when the producers expressed themselves as favoring an increase in the price of milk. Chestertown dairymen are receiving \$2.74 a hundred pounds for four percent milk, but in view of the high cost of feed this is not deemed sufficient. The price wanted is \$3 a hundred.

**SNOWSTORM BREAKS WEATHER RECORDS**  
Col. Wm. J. Vannort, one of our oldest citizens, says the Halloween snowstorm beat all records that he can recall. The snow began falling at 2 o'clock Friday, Oct. 30th, and continued until after six o'clock. The mercury registered below 30 degrees. Blooming flowers were nipped and late vegetables hurt somewhat. Many farmers have not finished seeding and the snow made the outlook poor.  
There is no disputing the fact that our weather is on the excrement. The cold of Monday and Tuesday of last week would have done honor to January. It is not, however, so much different from that of 100 years ago because we find the following in the cold of Monday and Tuesday of last week: "The thermometer which a week ago ranged above 80 in this city stood yesterday at 32 from the Baltimore Gazette of Tuesday, we learn that on the evening preceding a traveler to Baltimore from Pipe Creek passed through a storm of snow." Possibly the only difference is that in those days there were no coal strikes to contend with.

**NEW CONCERN BUYS SHORE BUS LINES**  
The sale of the Shore Transit Line, Inc., to a newly-formed corporation to be known as the Red Star Motor Coaches, Inc., of Salisbury, is announced. Through the purchase all physical equipment, including twelve motor buses, non-operated by the Shore Line, as well as the good will of the system, is acquired by the new company.  
Incorporation papers have been filed through the law offices of Miles Bailey & Mitchell for an authorized capitalization of 3,000 shares of preferred stock and 3,000 shares of common stock of no par value.  
The Red Star Corporation is formed as a subsidiary company of Day & Zimmerman, Philadelphia engineers and bankers, who developed and recently sold the Eastern Shore Gas and Electric Company for several million dollars. All officers and directors of the new company are residents of Philadelphia.  
The Shore Transit Line, Inc., operates a system of motor passenger bus service, said to be one of the largest such systems in the United States.  
It is operating under eighteen separate permits granted by the Maryland Public Service Commission covering the following interlocking lines: Ocean City, Salisbury, Claiborne, Easton, Chestertown, Rock Hall, Harlock, Tolchester Beach, Chestertown to Elkton. James P. McComas is president and ex-senator William J. Ogden secretary and treasurer of the Shore lines. Both are residents of Baltimore.  
Webster Lee Selfe will be retained as manager of the system, it was said, though the future program of the new company was not announced.

**A KENT COUNTIAN LOST AT SEA**  
Captain Lewis Ross, of near Galena, Kent county, W. G. Taylor, Secretary of State for Delaware, and E. R. Pusey, wealthy coal merchant of Wilmington, are all believed to have gone to their deaths when the 33-foot yacht Bunny III burned to the water's edge near the mouth of the Cape Fear river, according to Associated Press dispatches received Thursday.  
Confirmation that the yacht was destroyed was brought into Savannah, Ga., by Capt. J. F. Davis, master of the schooner Mary A. Shary, which made port Thursday.  
He saw and identified the derelict Captain Davis says, "There was no trace of its passengers."  
Captain Davis ordered a boarding party to visit the hulk and make a through inspection. The craft was identified by the designation M-1041 on its stern and a black and gold rabbit's head on either bow.  
All decks were burned away, except a small part of the forward deck. No bodies were found aboard.  
Captain Davis stood by for 12 hours, but found no trace of survivors.  
The three men embarked from Wilmington to take the inland route to Miami, Fla. They were last heard of alive in Southport, N. C., eight days ago, when they put in to refuel.

**POST TO PARADE ARMISTICE DAY**  
Members of Frank Jarman Post, American Legion, are arranging a celebration of Armistice Day, which will include a parade of members of the post with other military units in the town and the full detachment of Sheen's Cavalry.  
The line of march will be from the foot of High street through the principal streets of the town to Washington College, where a patriotic address will be delivered by a prominent speaker and where students of Washington College and the general public will have a part in the exercises.  
Ceremonies will be in charge of Major John T. Kibler and G. Allen Jarman.

**SPORTING NOTES**  
Unlawful to kill Chinese Ringnecked pheasants. Closed season on same indefinitely.  
The 1925 hunting season will open in Maryland for Upland Game on November 10th and close January 1. This includes bob-white partridge (quail), ruffed grouse, woodcock, rabbits, squirrels and wild turkeys. (There is a closed season on wild turkey in Garrett county until 1930.) Also a closed season on deer except in Allegany county and on the Woodmont Rod and Gun Club in Washington county. One buck deer may be killed per season with an antler six inches or more in length, between December 1st and December 15th.  
**Bag Limits**  
Partridge 12, Ruffed Grouse 2, Woodcock 6, Rabbits 4, Squirrels 25 per day, Wild Turkey 1 in any one season.  
**Non-Export**  
It is unlawful to export any game (wildfowl excepted) out of Maryland, except licensed hunters may carry out one day's bag limit.  
It is unlawful to sell, offer for sale, purchase or offer to purchase bob-white quail, Chinese ringnecked pheasants, ruffed grouse or wild turkeys.  
**Licenses**  
License for hunters who are residents of any county is \$1.10 which permits hunting in the county of his residence. State-wide license permits hunting in all counties, \$5.10 for residents of State. Non-residents \$10.50. Non-residents who are assessed with property in Maryland at \$500 or more may procure their license at the same rate as a resident, except the Clerk's Fee is 50 cents for all non-residents.  
It is unlawful to trespass or hunt on any property which is posted against trespassing, therefore, it is advisable when hunting to request permission of the owner or tenant of the property on which you desire to hunt before trespassing thereon.  
The law requires the license to be in possession while hunting, and at the same time a tag must be displayed on outer garment, center of back, between shoulders, which is furnished when license is purchased. The penalty for violation of same is \$15.00.

**DUCKERS BAG MANY DUCKS**  
Guns on all ducking shores in the vicinity of Chestertown report the first day's shooting better than for a number of years past. Hall's Point Gun Club members were the leaders, with a total of 130 ducks killed, most of which were of good quality.  
Ringgold's Point Club members bagged a total of thirty, while excellent scores were made at all the Chester river blinds except at the headquarters. The only point at which shooting was poor was at Cedar Point, where the ducks failed to decoy.  
State Game Warden E. Lee LeCompte has advised all deputy game wardens to warn gunners against exceeding the "bag limit," which is 25 ducks to a man.

**POOR AIM SAVES LIFE**  
The poor aim of William Kinich, of Rock Hall, Md., saved his life on Sunday afternoon, 26st instant, because of domestic difficulties. Kinich determined to commit suicide. He pointed a sawed-off shotgun at his heart and pulled the trigger. The charge missed its target, however, and entered his left shoulder.  
He was carried to University Hospital where it was said he will recover.

**TO HOLD MEMORIAL MEETING**
