MEETING OF FARMERS CONSIDER GROWING OF FLAX IN KENT

Wilmingtonians Make Offer To Build Big Plant and Pay \$20 a Ton--4,000 Acres Wanted.

Members of the Kent County Farm Bureau and other farmers in the county together with a number of business men in Chestertown assembled in the court house on Saturday afternoon to hear a discussion of the proposal to establish a flax industry in Kent county by Philadelphia, Wilmington and foreign capitalists. Harry F. Jefferson, president of the Chestertown Business Men's Association presided at the meeting and Wm. G. Smyth was secretary. S. Friedberger, president of the San-Knit-ary Textile Mills, of Philadelphia, explained the proposition offered by the capitalists which calls for the establishment of a flax fibre plant in Chestertown with buildings and equipment to cost between \$800,000 and \$900,000, provided the farmers in this section will agree to grow 4,000 acres in flax during the year for a given number of years. He assured the farmers that flax can be grown to financial profit in Kent county, yielding from 2 1/2 to 3 tons per acre for which the operators will furnish a contract to pay \$20 per ton for the raw material.

Dr. L. C. Cope, representative of a Syndicate of London capitalists, explained the financial end of the proposition, stating that not a dollar of local capital will be required to finance the industry, but that \$1,500,000 will be expended in its development if the farmers will give their co-operation by signing a contract to grow the raw material for a given number of years.

Following a general discussion of the possibilities of the crop from a financial point of view, a committee was appointed to make an investigation of the proposition and to ascertain from the farmers whether they are willing to engage in the enterprise and also as to whether it will be possible to secure the required number of acres in this and adjacent counties. This committee is composed of County Agent, Horace B. Derrick, Senator W. B. Cope, Edgar R. Pennington, of Kennedyville; Wm. T. Brown, of Pomona, and E. Thomas Massey, president of the County Farm Bureau. This committee is required to give Dr. Cope a reply before the 10th of next month, as he sails for London on that date to confer with the foreign capitalists relative to the prospects for the establishment of the industry in this section. Another meeting will be held towards the end of the year with the capitalists when a final decision will be reached.

Wilbur Barnes, aged about 17, was arrested Sunday evening at his home near Cliff City in Quaker Neck, charged with an attempt to assault Margaret Taylor, the 9-year-old daughter of Mrs. Aaron Taylor Blackiston. Sheriff Wm. M. Goodman was notified of the occurrence by his brother, Elmer Goodman over the telephone, and Deputy Sheriff Harry Archibald was immediately sent to the farm of Cornelius C. Brown, Jr., where the attempted assault occurred. He found the boy and brought him to the jail here, where he awaits a hearing. The circumstances connected with the attempted assault as related by the little girl are that she went to the Brown farm as was her daily custom to get milk for her mother. When she reached the house Barnes, the Negro, was upstairs dressing, having just finished milking. When he came down stairs he asked the child what she wanted, and upon receiving her reply he threw the girl across a table in the kitchen, but failed to accomplish his purpose because the child succeeded in getting away from him, and ran towards the barn where he overtook her and made a second attempt, but was prevented by the girl eluding him and running home. There were two 6-year-old colored boys who saw the affair.

The child returned to the home of her mother and related the circumstances to her. An investigation of the child's condition was made by Dr. H. P. Copeland, of Chestertown, but while there were bruises on the child's limbs and other marks of a struggle about her body, there were no evidence that the girl had been otherwise injured.

Sheriff Goodman, in order to avoid trouble, took the prisoner to Baltimore Tuesday night.

FARMERS SEE DAIRY INDUSTRY IN PICTURE
An audience of more than 150 chiefly consisting of dairy farmers and their families, viewed with interest the three-reel motion picture film, "Safeguarding the Foster Mothers of the World," which was shown Thursday night in Firemen's Hall, through the courtesy of P.M. Brooks, Chestertown. The film deals with the problems confronting dairymen today in establishing their business on a profitable basis by the proper feeding and care of their cows. One large section is devoted to the manufacturing processes used at the great Larra mills, and the safeguards that are provided to make mixed feed uniform, clean and balanced as a dairy ration.

After the picture show there was a brief address by M. A. Diehl, who took as his subject, "More Milk—More Profits," answering, at the conclusion of his talk, individual questions from dairymen.

The winners of the premiums were Mrs. Jesse Hurd, who won the bread mixer, Richard Schaubert, the milk pail, and Harry Smith, the milking stool.

3 BUILDINGS BURNED IN CRUMPTON

Splendid Work of Three Fire Companies—Possibly Saved Major Portion of Town From Destruction Tuesday.

Fire broke out in the store of Gilbert Brown, of Crumpton, about 8 o'clock Tuesday morning, and for several hours threatened the entire town with destruction. Even with the combined efforts of the Millington, Chestertown and Centerville Fire Companies the blaze was not checked until it had completely destroyed the Brown store and two dwelling houses adjoining. The dwellings were the property of Mrs. Spencer Merrick.

So serious was the conflagration that dozens of families in the town moved their entire household effects to places of safety, for fear the entire town would be burned. At different times there was hardly a building in the town that did not catch fire. Citizens were constantly on the alert for small blazes and it was due solely to their watchfulness that a more serious destruction did not take place.

Companies Do Good Work
The work of the Millington, Chestertown and Centerville Fire Companies elicited many complimentary remarks from the onlookers. This was the first serious fire in which the recently organized company at Millington has taken part. The work of the new engine and equipment showed up to a great advantage. The hose of this company was connected with the river at least a half mile from the blaze, and the new engine pumped, with great force, a stream of water the entire distance. It was also noticed that in the half mile of hose line there was not a single leak.

It is understood that all of the property burned was partly covered by insurance.

A fire occurred in the middle building at Washington College at 2 a. m. Thursday and did about \$200 damage. It is thought a lighted cigarette thrown carelessly in a pile of rubbish under the stairway caused the fire. The students and local fire company responded and did good work. This building was burned in 1927.

Conlyn E. Noland, the hustling young merchant on High street, Chestertown, on Saturday purchased from the Chestertown Bank of Md. the property now occupied by him as a store room. The purchase includes the stores occupied by H. B. Role and Dr. J. T. Power and residence tenanted by Mr. Thawley. The lot runs clear thru to Cannon street where a comfortable residence is located, occupied by Mr. Stoops. The price was \$18,500. Mr. Noland's business has grown rapidly and he was almost forced to buy in order to enlarge so as to accommodate his trade.

The Chestertown Bank purchased this property during the war from the Thomas heirs.

H. T. Jewell, agent, has sold to L. Heller, of Chestertown, the Rollison farm, near Pomona, for \$2,000.
