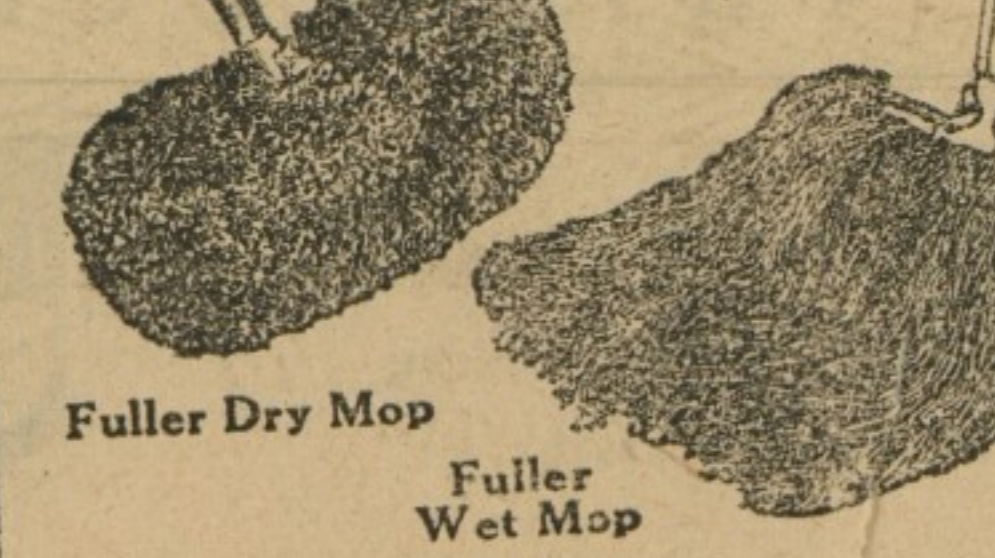

KENT COUNTY DAIRYMEN SELL OVER \$500,000 WORTH OF MILK ANNUALLY

EFFICIENT METHODS ARE INCREASING DAILY

A trip over Kent county today cannot fail to convince one who has an "eye" for dairying, that Kent farmers are rapidly progressing in the Dairy business. Not many years ago one would not have seen, in driving through Kent county, the many silos that rise above the horizon on the right and on the left, as you drive down the road. New and better fences have come along with dairying, which has added to the assets of the farms.

In the spring, numerous patches of alfalfa add that green luster to hundreds of farms, that causes the farmer to smile, for he knows it means hay full of protein and milk and profit next winter. Other farmers choose soybeans or cow peas to "turn the same trick." Henry has found how to get a stand of sweet clover and that it comes up early and furnishes abundant pasture for all his cattle.

You drive up a lane and a rather new milk house is readily recognized and "Bill" wouldn't be without it either, for it keeps his milk clean and cool in summer. Occasionally a bull-pen is in view as one walks out to the dairy-barn and a fine purebred bull stands eyeing you. Mr. Farmer takes pleasure in relating his blood lines and the production "back of him." An inspection of the stable shows tight ceilings, whitewashed walls and clean gutters.

Every herd has some good milkers and many farmers are keeping records of each cow, too. And "Sue" gets so much feed and "Goldie" and "Whitey," depending upon the milk they give. The roughage and grain usually make a balanced ration when you figure it out. Calves and heifers that look like they will make good producers are seen here and there.

The milk is delivered to clean receiving stations which have modern equipment and loaded by gravity into special tank cars for Philadelphia. The Producers Organization, the Intra-State Milk Producers' Association, handles the problem of price for the dairymen and the checks come in every month, over a half-million dollars worth come into Kent every year.
