Slay about 40 years ago and a most loving and sympathetic wife through all the long years she has made him. He survives her together with a number of nephews and nieces. R. H. She was a kindly soul. In the garden of her life she had no room for the weeds of hate, envy or greed to grow. She wore no royal raiment—her garb was that of humility. Sorrow bathed itself with hope in the unaltered door step welcome to the needy and heavy laden. A good woman has gone—one who will be missed in this community, for Mrs. Slay "lived in the house by the side of the road and was a friend to man."

She has been a life long member of Emmanuel P. E. Church, Chestertown, and took great interest in all church activities.

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Downey, Sr., returned Friday from Baltimore where they spent the winter.

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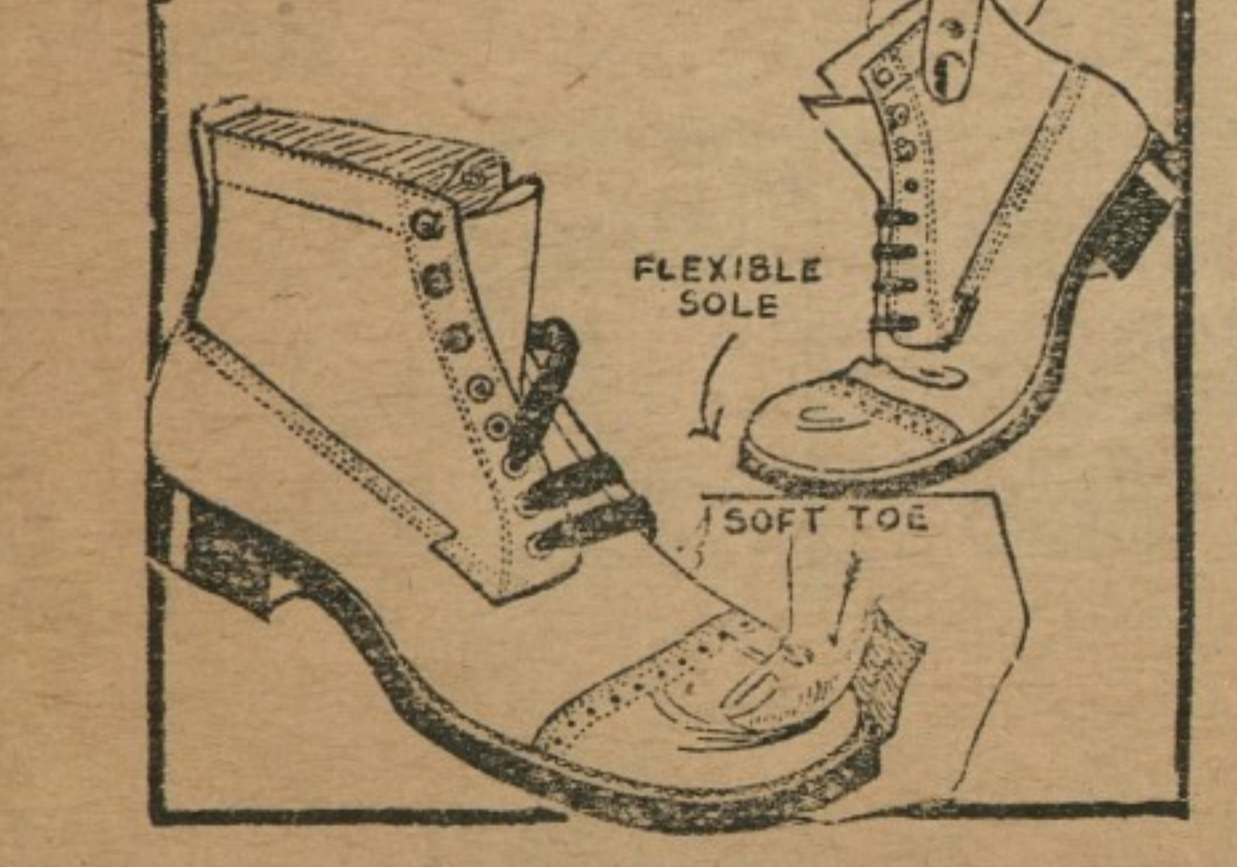
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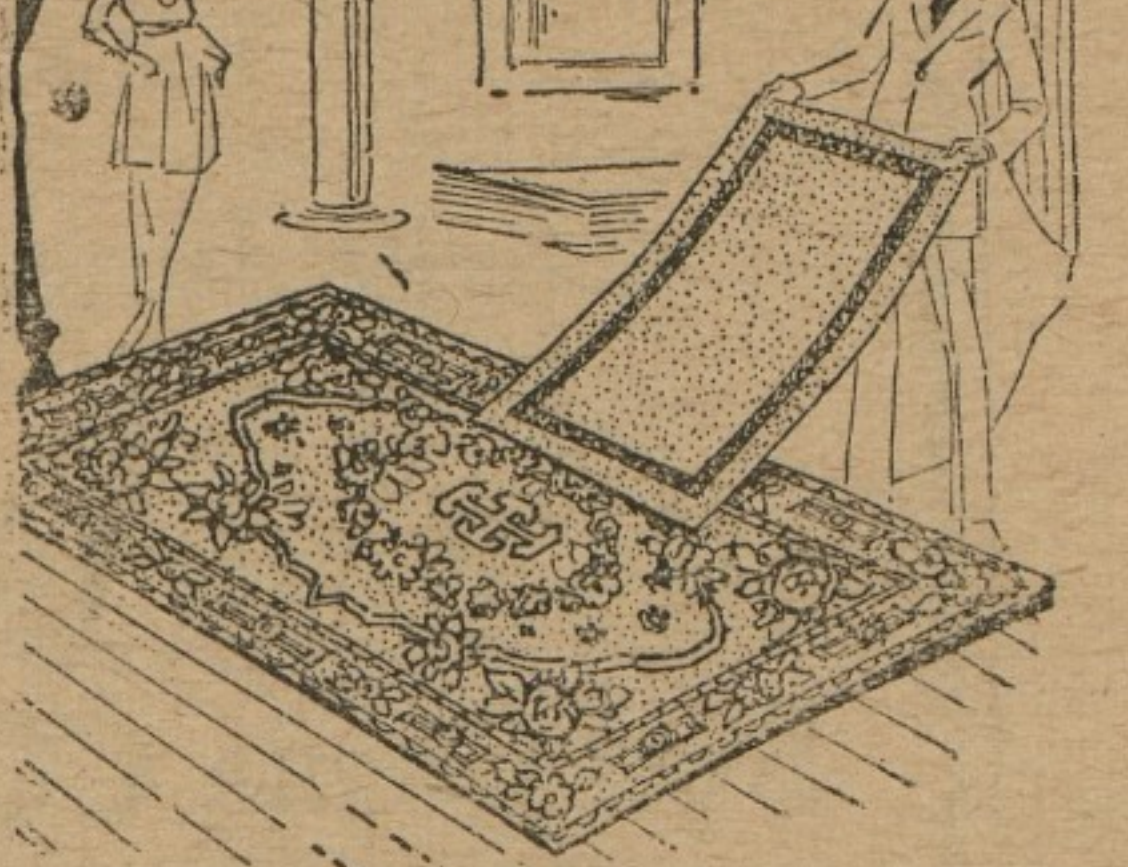
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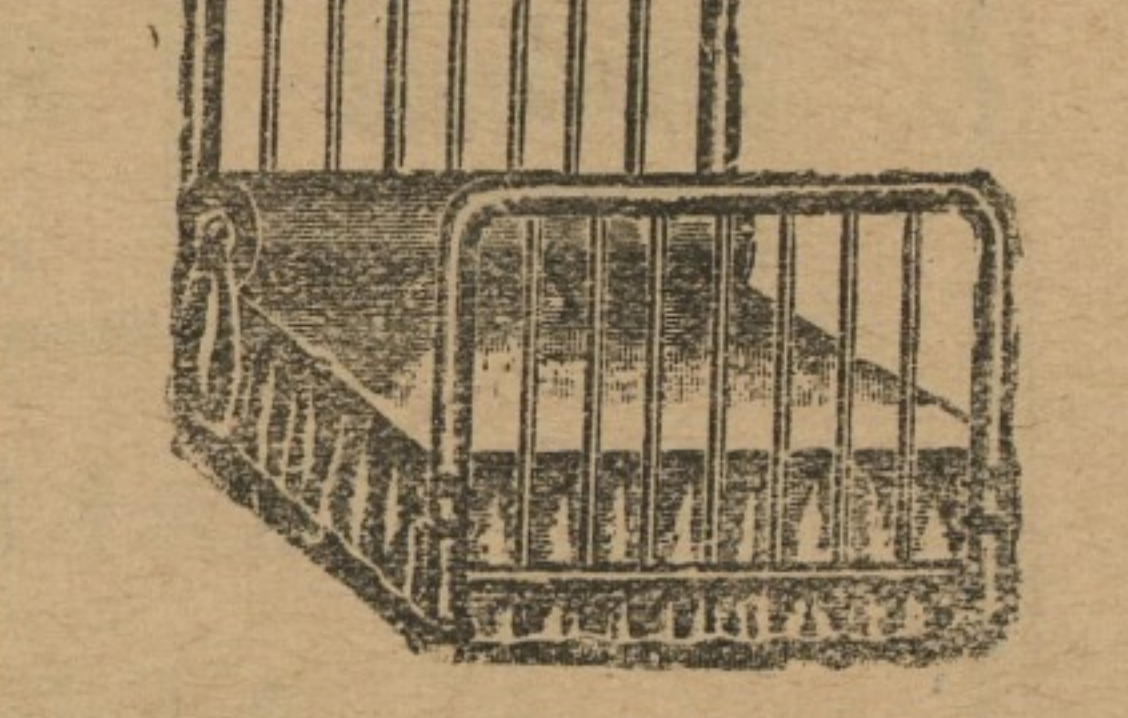
