SPRING TO RETURN SAYS WEATHER MAN

The return of spring after one of the hardest recorded cold spells is predicted by the Weather Bureau for the whole of the eastern United States yesterday.

Forecaster C. L. Mitchell says, "By the latter part of the week, the temperature is likely to be about normal and warmer weather prevalent all over the east. No more cold weather is at present in sight."

Below freezing temperatures prevailed generally as far south as Virginia and Kentucky. The coldest place on the map was White River, Ontario, with minimum of 16 below zero. It was 34 degrees here.
