**NEW INDUSTRY FOR CHESTERTOWN**

Elkton Fireworks Concern To Open Branch Here As Soon As Labor Can Be Gotten.

Negotiations between the Chestertown Business Men's Association and J. B. Decker, proprietor of the Victor Sparkler Company, of Elkton, toward establishing a branch factory here were successfully completed Monday at a conference when the latter agreed to establish a branch factory here at once upon condition that a force of 75 employes be supplied, the number to be increased to 150 as business justifies.

The Business Men's Association obligated itself to supply the necessary force and the large woolen mill building has been leased. The establishment of the industry marks a distinct epoch in the industrial life of the community and fills a long-felt want. The company has just been awarded a large contract for supplying fireworks for the Philadelphia Sesqui Centennial and part of the order will be filled in the Chestertown factory. The committee for the Business Men's Association which successfully conducted the negotiations was composed of Harry F. Jefferson, president; Dr. Paul E. Tisworth, of Washington College, and Wm. B. Wilmer. The plant will begin operations as soon as the equipment is installed an the necessary labor engaged.

**DENIED AWARD FOR HELPING TO SAVE VESSEL FROM FIRE**  
Edward Clothier, of Rock Hall, who with others libeled the ferry boat Eastern Shore, of the Eastern Shore Ferry Company, for \$150,000 for saving the vessel from destruction by fire, was denied compensation in an oral opinion by Judge Morris A. Soper, in the United States District Court, Friday.

Judge Soper decided that Mr. Clothier had been in the employ of the company, was not entitled to an award for salvage services.

The opinion, however, favored the claims of Jesse A. Urie, William E. Joiner, John H. Thompson and Clifton Dinwney, holding in sub curia the respective amounts to be awarded them.

**SATTERFIELD WINS ELECTION**  
Mayor Charles N. Satterfield was re-elected a member of the Board of Town Commissioners over his opponent, J. W. Kirby. Both are Republicans, by a majority of 71 votes. **APRIL TERM OF COURT**  
Court adjourned Friday until Monday so that Sheriff Goodman could carry 7 prisoners to their respective places and thus relieve the congestion at the jail.

After two days trial Oscar Warwick, colored, was found guilty of manslaughter Tuesday and sentenced to three years in the Maryland Penitentiary for killing his uncle, August Warwick, near Massey. The trial was by jury. The jury was out slightly over an hour. W. F. Russell, Jr., represented the defendant, and S. Scott Beck the State.

While crossing the tracks of the Pennsylvania Railroad Co., which pass the ice plant, some months ago, Walters was struck by a passenger train and fatally injured, during a short time after the accident, Mr. Nicholson carried a policy on the life of Walters, to which the widow laid claim on the ground that her husband was in the performance of his duties. It was claimed that he was compelled to cross the railroad tracks to secure a part of some machinery for the ice plant and was injured by the plant in the discharge of his duties when killed.

Mr. Nicholson claimed that he was not responsible for the action of Walters in crossing the track, who, because of physical defect, could not hear the approaching train.

The commission decided that Mrs. Walters is not entitled to collect the insurance. Herbert E. Perkins, attorney for the widow, took an appeal to the Circuit Court and the case may reach the Maryland Court of Appeals.

State vs. John Parks and Ethel Parks for maintaining a public nuisance near Rock Hall. Jury trial. Verdict guilty and fined \$50.

State vs. Benj. Brown charged with larceny of \$4 from Georgeanna Johnson, Quaker Neck. Court trial. Guilty. Sentenced to 12 months in Maryland Penitentiary.

State vs. Wilber Barnes on charge of assault with intent to rape Margaret Taylor. Court trial. Verdict, not guilty on first count but guilty of assault and sentenced to 12 months in House of Correction.

The jurors not impaneled in the above case were finally discharged.
