BASEBALL LEAGUE FORMED BY M. E. CHURCHES

Monday evening, May 24th, Rev. Jefferson, of Crumpton M. E. Church, together with ministers and several young men of Sudlersville, Crumpton, Millington, Galena and Fairlee met at the parsonage of Crumpton M. E. Church to discuss plans for a Church Baseball League.

Vice President, S. C. Smith, of Sudlersville.

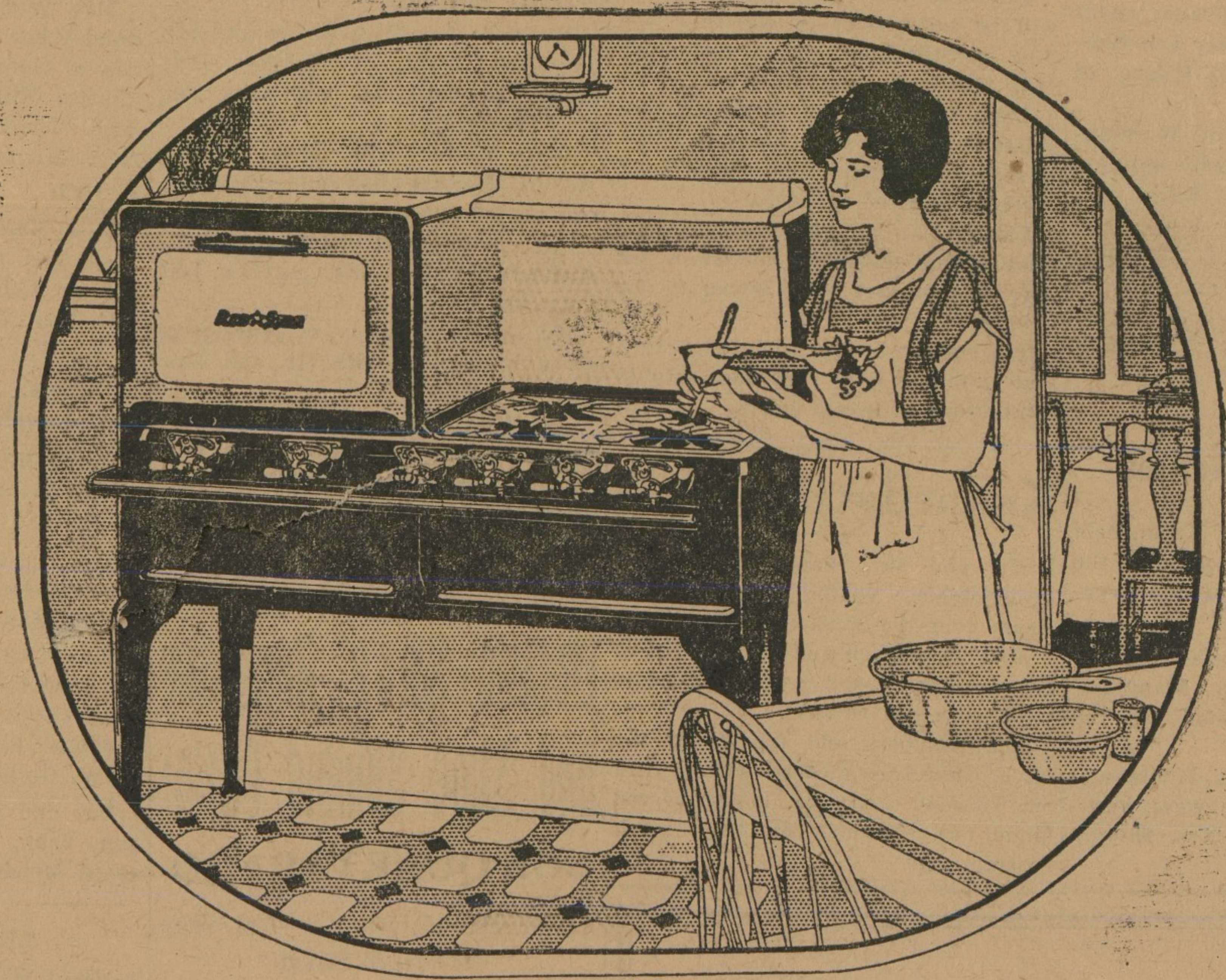
Secretary, Rev. Grant, of Crumpton Hill.
