HOWARD ATWELL IS KILLED IN THE CITY

Howard P. Atwell, motorcycle officer, aged 40 years, of 501 East Tenth street, Wilmington, died at the Delaware Hospital Tuesday night shortly before 8 o'clock, of injuries received at the intersection of Washington street and Concord avenue, when he was thrown from his motorcycle, fracturing his skull at the base of the brain. The accident is said to have occurred about one hour before his death when he was coming in Concord avenue, following a man who is alleged to have been speeding.

Charles A. Pipka, aged 23 years, of 117 West Twenty-fourth street, operator of the machine with which Atwell collided, was arrested by Motorcycle Officer Carey and held on a technical charge of manslaughter.

According to Pipka, he was driving south on Washington street at slow speed when Atwell, who was coming east on Concord avenue approached the intersection. In an effort to avoid a collision, Pipka said he swerved his machine to the left and Atwell, evidently of the same intention threw his weight over causing the motorcycle to skid the right hand wheel of the Tipka automobile a glancing blow. Atwell was catapulted over the handlebars of the motorcycle and thrown twenty-five feet to the opposite side of the street, where his head struck the curb. Pipka ran to his assistance and with the aid of C. W. Schagrin, 2403 Harrison street, placed the injured policeman in the latter's machine and rushed him to the Delaware Hospital.

His condition was such that an operation could not be performed and Atwell died a short time after.

Atwell was one of the most popular members of the department. He completed ten years of service last November.

He was a carpenter by trade. Mr. Atwell is survived by his wife who was Miss Helen Jewell, of Still Pond, and two sons, Howard, aged 19 years, and William, aged 18 years, the latter employed in the advertising department of the News-Journal Company. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. Alfred Crew, of Chestertown, and three brothers, John and Wallace Atwell, of Kennedyville, and Dr. Louis P. Atwell, of Still Pond.

He was a regular attendant of Scott M. E. Church, when his police duties permitted, and the pastor, the Rev. Dr. Wise, will have charge of the funeral services.



KENT WHEAT CROP REPORTED GOOD

Prediction are that the Kent county wheat crop this year will just about equal the one of last season. While straw is showing up as light, the quality of grain in most fields is such as will make the total yield very good.

While it is impossible to exactly foretell the average return per acre, the indications from the fields that have already been harvested are that the crop as a whole is unusually good, particularly so when the meagre straw is taken into consideration.

The number of women and girls helping in the fields has been unusually large on account of the high price of labor.

CHESTERTOWN JOINS IN JEFFERSON DAY

Chestertown joined on Monday with the nation in ushering in a week's celebration of the 150th anniversary of American Independence.

On June 28, 1776, Thomas Jefferson presented to the Continental Congress, in his own handwriting, the original draft of the Declaration, which, after a week's deliberation, was adopted. Monday at 11.11 o'clock, the very minute on which the draft was presented Mayors throughout the country joined at the same instant in ringing bells in their respective cities in echo to the ringing of that historic bell.

In Chestertown several hundred persons gathered about the band stand in the Park and joined in a very interesting celebration. T. D. Bowers presided at the meeting and introduced the speakers. Prior to the meeting Mayor Eatterfield tapped the fire bell and Officer Cooper rang the town bell while all the bells in the churches pealed out for independence.
