CHAMBER OF COMMERCE FOR KENT COUNTY

Although plans have been discussed for some time, the first definite steps toward the formation of a County-Wide Chamber of Commerce for Kent County were made yesterday afternoon at a meeting held in the local Court House. At this meeting it was decided that a chamber should be formed bearing the name of the Kent County Chamber of Commerce. The organization is to work hand in hand with the Del-Mar-Va Association.

Temporary Officers Chosen
Thomas W. Perkins of Chestertown was named as temporary chairman and M. deK Smith, Jr., also of Chestertown, was chosen Campaign Treasurer.

The county was divided into districts corresponding to the election districts with the one exception that districts 4 and 7 are to be combined. The following men were named on organization chairman for their various districts: C. M. Melvin, of Millington, District No. 1; Edgar Pennington, of Kennedyville, District No. 2; Howard F. Owens, of Betterson, District No. 3; Thomas W. Perkins, of Chestertown, District No. 3 and 4; Ellsworth Leary, of Rock Hall, District No. 5; H. S. Startt, Fairlee, District No. 6.

Del-Mar-Va Men Present
F. W. Maloe, Director of Extension and Carl H. Monsees, Director of Research for the Del-Mar-Va Association, were present and will aid in the organization of the County Chamber.

It is planned to have meetings soon to secure membership in Chestertown, Millington, Betterson and Rock Hall.

There will be two classes of membership, Commercial and Civic. The former has a fee of \$25 a year and the latter one of \$10.

The budget as outlined at Tuesday's meeting calls for an outlay of \$12,000. However, \$5000 of this amount is the which has already been subscribed in the county to the Del-Mar-Va Association and leaves, therefore, only \$7000 in new pledges to be secured throughout the county.

Much enthusiasm was manifested by the small gathering at the meeting on Tuesday. The success of the organization, however, depends upon the acceptance of the plans by the county as a whole.

The writer read an article in the Baltimore Sun of June 23rd, in which the writer sought to impress the idea that one, Senator Ross of Kansas, east the vote to prevent the impeachment of President Johnson, which event occurred shortly after the civil war.

Senator Ross of Kansas may have voted against the resolution for impeachment as the letter stated, but the fact remains that the effort to impeach was defeated through the influence and votes of the late Senator Luman Trumbell of Ohio and General George Vickers, who was then a Senator from Maryland.

Mr. Vickers was from our own town, the father of the late Harrison W. Vickers, Sr., and the grandfather of the present Harrison W. Vickers. General Vickers had occupied the floor of the Senate Chamber for several hours, with his well-known oratory and lung-force to stay until the contest was closed for or against.

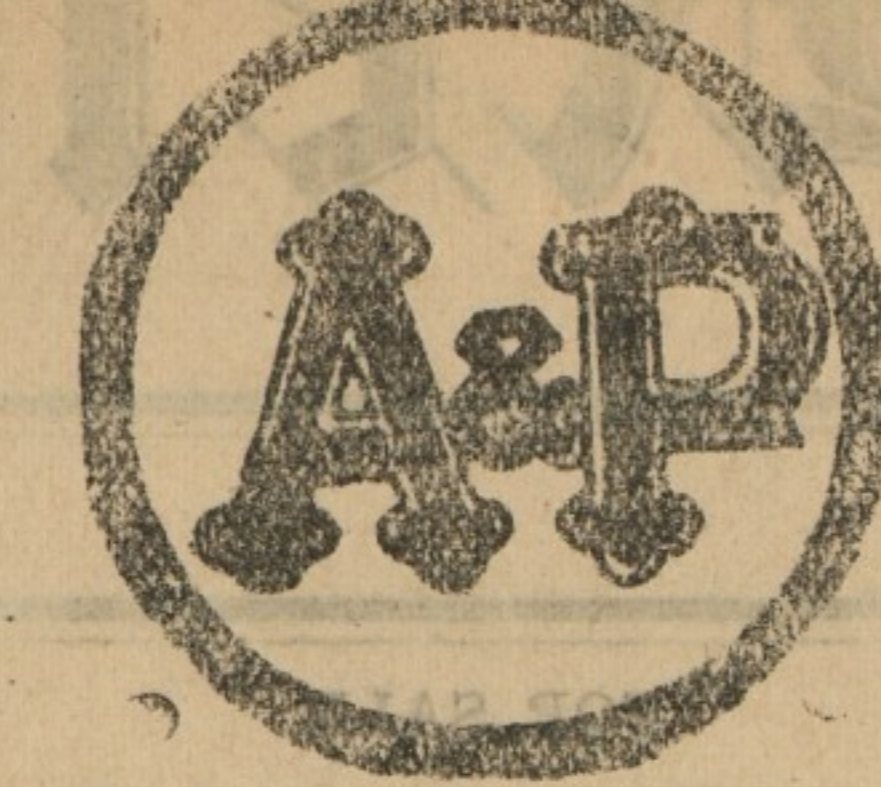
General Vickers was a son of our own town; a lawyer, who, by hard labor and sticktoativeness reached top of the ladder as a practitioner in the county and State courts; was appointed U. S. Senator by the Governor, and acquired a notability that was well and deservedly recognized. Men having Mr. Vickers' self-controlling will-power, deserve the success and the plaudits of their constituency.

Senators Vickers and Trumbell occupied the floor of the Senate for fourteen hours, thus, together holding the situation until the curtain rang down for that session of Congress.

If it is the contention of the "Sun" article that his statement is historical, it is but another evidence that historians and publicity writers in too many instances strive to fill the mind of the reading public with a partisan or one-eyed viewpoint.
