LOGS DISABLE BOAT FOR TOLCHESTER

Steamer With 1,000 Persons Aboard Sounded Distress Signals — Paddle Damaged — Vessel After Floating Half-Hour, Is Given Tow To Tolchester Beach.

Carrying more than 1,000 excursionists from Baltimore, the steamer Express, of the Tolchester Company became disabled Sunday morning while crossing the Chesapeake Bay en route to Tolchester.

For a half hour the vessel, commanded by Capt. F. W. Kolb, drifted about while efforts were made to repair paddle wheel damage. When the attempts proved futile, distress signals were sounded.

The whistle blasts for aid were responded to by the Steamer Annapolis, another ship of the company, which was returning from Tolchester to the city. Hawasers from the stern of the Annapolis were attached to the bow of the Express and the disabled vessel was towed to Tolchester resort — its destination.

Other than the breakdown no trouble was encountered, according to W. H. Hudson, president of the company, and no excitement was caused among the excursionists aboard the Express.

The boat left Pier No. 16 at 8.30 a. m. The engine ran smoothly until the center of the bay was reached, when they stopped suddenly. Investigation and attempts to repair the damage disclosed that the breakdown was of such a nature that repairs could not be made without aid from shore. Distress signals then were sounded.

Capt. Harry Newnam was in command of the Annapolis. The disabled vessel arrived at Tolchester a little more than an hour late.

Unable to return to the city, the Express remained at Tolchester the entire afternoon. This necessitated the canceling of the regular afternoon trip to the resort.

Numerous telephone messages were received by officials of the company from friends and relatives of persons aboard the steamer who had heard that the Express had been disabled and then learned that the boat did not return to the city for the afternoon trip.

The Annapolis and Emma Giles have been caring for the big excursion business for two days. The Express returned on duty Wednesday.
