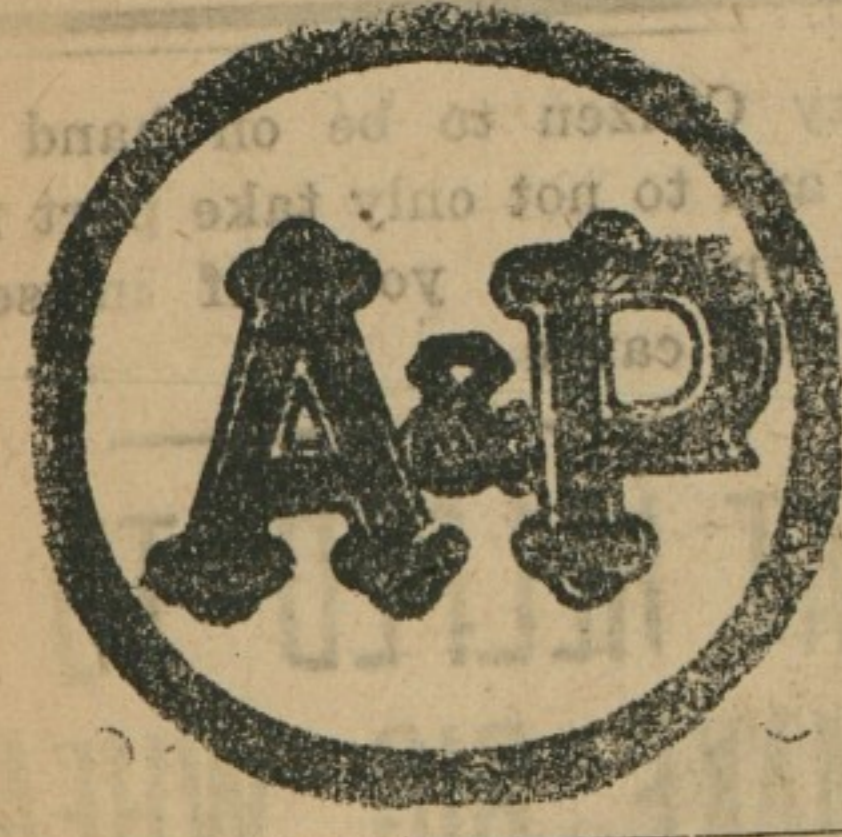

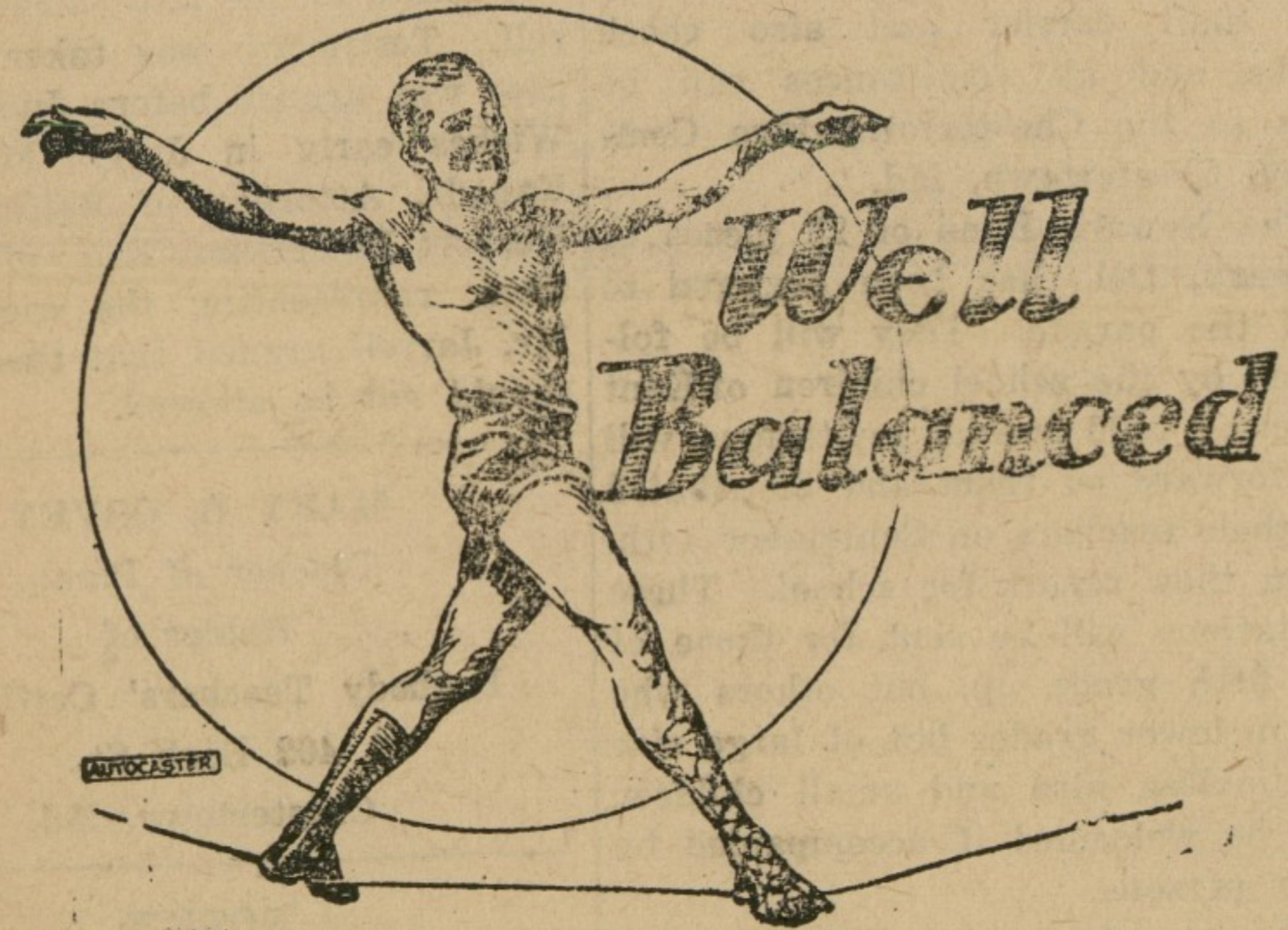

The English Version Of The Battle Of Caulk's Field

Dr. J. S. William Jones, who has been traveling in England and France for the past two months and is now attending the summer meeting at Cambridge University, in a letter under date of August 14th has, among other things, this to say: "Directly across from the Houses of Parliament and under the shadow of Westminster Abbey is St. Margaret's, than which no church in London, especially to Americans, is of greater interest. "In the chancel lies buried the body of Sir Walter Raleigh and a tablet to the right of the east en-

trance carries the following quaint inscription: "Within ye chancel of this church was interred ye body of ye great Sir Walter Raleigh, Kt., on the day he was beheaded in Old Palace Yard, Westminster, Oct. 29, anno Domini 1618. Reader: Should you reflect on his errors, remember his many virtues and that he was mortal. A very beautiful window in memory of the Raleigh, presented to St. Margaret's by American citizens more than forty years ago, is greatly admired.

"The Milton Window attracts much attention and is all the more interesting to Americans since beneath it there is a fine tribute by Whittier. In the church Milton's second wife and little daughter were buried. "Other windows and tablets are pointed out by guides, including the

East Window, representing the Crucifixion, which is regarded as one of the most beautiful windows in all England, and tablets to the memory of Lady Arabella Stuart (1615), Admiral Blake (1657), Bishop Phillips Brooks (1894) and Dean Farrar (1903).

"The window and tablets named above are of great historical interest but one tablet neither listed in guide-books nor pointed out by official guides, attracted my attention, while I unaccompanied was wandering around in the church. To be more exact, I should say that the name, Sir Peter Parker, and not the tablet aroused my interest. Naturally, I connected the name with the battle of Caulk's Field (if permitted by historical license to call it a battle) and the reading of a line or two satisfied me that the tablet marked the last resting place of the man whose name should be familiar to every school-boy of Kent county. A church attendant who happened along at the time kindly offered to move some benches which interfered with my seeing the inscription in full.

"I am passing a copy of a part of it on to you without further comment than to say that, if I remember correctly, the American account of the battle differs materially from that contained in the inscription, which follows:

"In the pious hope of a glorious resurrection, pursued through virtue, faith and valour, here lie interred the mortal remains of Sir Peter Parker, Baronet, aged 28 years, Captain of his Majesty's frigate Menelaus. An accomplished officer and seaman, who after landing with a part of his crew on the coast of America, defeated an enemy supported by cavalry and artillery three times the number of his own forces, and, in the moment of victory, received a mortal wound, under which he continued to cheer his men to follow up their triumph until sinking under its fatal result he fell into the arms of the companions of his glory, and bravely surrendered, on the field of battle, his own gallant spirit to the mercy of Heaven."
