Council For Farm Women To Meet In Chestertown
Chestertown will be the mecca next Tuesday for a remarkable gathering of farm women called the National Farm Women's Council. The hour is 2 p. m. and the Court House is the place. Public invited, especially the farm women. The party of eight forming this Council will lunch at Worton Manor the home of Col. and Mrs. Jonathan D. Marwell. Here they will inspect new labor-saving devices and methods of harvesting corn and other points of interest. They will aim to visit farms managed by owners. The Council is here to learn from farmers the practical end of farming as Kent is one of the up-to-date sections where this may be studied to best advantage.

Mrs. Wm. S. Hilles, daughter of the late Thomas F. Bayard a former Secretary of State, Dr. F. B. Bomberger, of University of Maryland Agricultural College, Army Yeungling, of Bucalo, Robert Marsh, of Washington, D. C., ex-secretary National Farm Council, and other well-known speakers, including Mrs. Harold Baker and Mrs. Williams of Kent, will attend the meeting. The subject of poultry will be especially emphasized and much discussion follow the addresses.

Mrs. Isaac Dixon, mother of the late Wm. T. Dixon, owner of Green Point farm, is at the head of the movement which is to be a part of the National Farm Federation of Women's Clubs. Mrs. Dixon, who resides in Baltimore, is a farm owner and a member of the Professional and Business Women's Club. For many years she has been identified with movements toward improvement of life on the farm. She will tell at this meeting why she left College at 17 to become a dirt farmer. Mrs. Earle Nicholson, Rev. Colvin Randall and Mrs. Robert D. Hoopes have been named on the invitation committee to further the work of the Council after this meeting.

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A Great Democratic Victory in Kent County

Every Democrat Was Elected By Majorities Ranging From 655 To 1347
Robert A. Shallcross Gets The Largest Total Of Votes With Charles D. Wood And Arthur H. Brice Runners Up—T. Ringgold Jones And Clarence Newsome Come Near The 3,000 Mark—A United Democracy Proven By The Vote—Some Cutting But No Organized Revolt.

STATE-WIDE CANDIDATE VOTE
U. S. Senator Tydings beat Weller 40,000 in city and 13,000 in counties his plurality being 52,000. Gov. Ritchie in city won by 50,000 and in counties by 12,000, his plurality being 58,000. Comptroller Gordy won by over 60,000; Attorney-General Robinson by 34,000; Young by over 71,000. The race in Baltimore for city offices was a parade for the Democrats.

The Fourth Legislative district which has a very large Negro vote, gave the Republicans their one State Senator in Baltimore—Harry O. Levin, the incumbent—and their three city house members of the House. Every other office went to the Democrats. All six Democratic candidates for Judges of the Supreme Bench were elected. Albert Sidney Johnson Owens, Democrat, defeated Judge Henry Duffy, Republican, by about 8,000. He is a brother-in-law to C. W. Perkins of Kent. The other five Democratic candidates, who were on the bench, were elected to 15-year terms by very much larger margins. The State Legislature is overwhelmingly Democratic. Apparently twenty-one of the twenty-nine members of the State Senate are of that party, and it is expected that complete returns will show that the Democratic majority in the House of Delegates is almost as large. In the national aspect of the election, the Democrats, in addition to electing Mr. Tydings to the Senate, won five of the six members of the House of Representatives, a gain of one. They reelected T. Alan Goldborough in the First Congressional district; elected William P. Cole, Jr., in the Second in place of Mr. Tydings; elected Vincent L. Palmisano in the Third, which has been represented since 1920 by John Philip Hill, and reelected J. Charles Linthicum in the Fourth and Stephen W. Gambrell in the Fifth. Frederick N. Zihlman, reelected in the Sixth, is the lone Republican member. On the "Shore" all Democrats were elected except in Cecil, Somerset and Dorchester. In the latter several Democrats were elected. In Cecil Crothers was defeated for Clerk by 91 and Groves was elected a member of the Orphans' Court. It seems that the next Maryland Senate will consist of twenty-one Democrats and eight Republicans. This is a gain of one for the Republicans over the last session.
