Hessey, 17, driver of the automobile which last week ran down and killed Catherine Chance, 8, is being held on four charges for a hearing which will take place next Monday, at 1 p. m. before Justice of the Peace Olin B. Stafford. The charges against young Hessey are: Failure to give right of way to pedestrian at street crossing; failure to give right of way; failure to keep to right of center of road, and reckless driving.

The accident resulted in the death of little Miss Catherine Chance at the crossing of High and Kent streets. The little girl, on the way to school, was struck by Hessey's car as she neared the curb on the left hand side of the street.

## Commission Arrives For New Official

Sheriff-elect J. Thomas Hadaway entered upon his duties as sheriff of Kent county for four years Tuesday. This will make three terms he has served. He will continue Deputy Lee for the present. Sheriff Goodman and family have removed to their home at Quaker Neck Wharf carrying with them the good will and best wishes of a large circle of friends.

The county commissioners and Orphans' Court Judges will take the oath of office next Tuesday. Messrs. S. J. Johnson and T. Ringgold Jones were re-elected for four years, the new member being Charles D. Wood. Jesse H. Usilton, the retiring President, has made a splendid record and goes out of office with the esteem and encomiums of the public. He also has the satisfaction of knowing that under his regime one of the lowest tax rates of recent years was declared. It is believed that John Medders will be re-elected clerk to the Board of County Commissioners and that Thomas J. Davis will succeed himself as supervisor of assessments. It is believed also that Gilbert B. Taylor will be re-elected county road engineer.

Other officials elected at the November term will not assume their duties until the expiration of the terms of the incumbents, at different intervals during the coming year. Judges of the Orphans' Court, E. A. Scott and J. Henry Thompson, re-elected, and James H. Groves, will take oath also Tuesday. Judge W. K. Hudson has made a faithful and industrious official. He resides at Fairlee.

## DR. GEORGE W. COOKE PROVES A GREAT BLESSING TO CHESTERTOWN AND VICINITY

The Gospel Crusade waged in this community during the past three weeks was brought to a close Sunday evening with a most delightful service. The meetings were held for the first two weeks in the M. E. Church and concluded in the M. P. Church.

Dr. Geo. W. Cooke was the preacher and Prof. Harold Vignelle was the singer and they were the best all-around workers in the cause of Christianity that the town has seen. Two nights later he decided for Christ and some days later stood with his boy to join the church.

They have been a benediction to this community and only the judgment day will record the great good accomplished. Last Sunday about 40 persons joined the M. E. Church and over 20 united with Christ M. P.

## POISON LIQUOR KILLS ALFRED LEROY GRAVES

Coroner Harry L. Dodd was called to Big Woods on Wednesday to hold an inquest over the remains of Alfred Leroy Graves, colored, who died under suspicious circumstances. After hearing evidence the jury with Jacob F. Thompson, foreman, rendered a verdict that the deceased came to his death by drinking poisonous liquor said to have been purchased from Oliver Taylor, colored.

Sheriff J. Thomas Hadaway placed Taylor in jail to await action of the Grand Jury. Stephen R. Collins, Esq., represented the State at the inquest.

## A. W. VAN SANT BADLY INJURED

Andrew W. Vansant, traveling salesman, formerly of Kent, living in Seaford was severely injured Tuesday night on the Seaford-Bridgeville State highway, north of Wainwright's filling station, when a car, in attempting to pass him hit the fender of the machine Vansant was driving. Vansant's car was turned over twice. Both cars was traveling south on the highway when the accident occurred.

When the car turned over the first time Vansant's head was thrust thru the windshield, cutting him badly about the face and head, and when it turned over the second time he came in contact with the glass door of the coupe, breaking it, the glass cutting through a heavy overcoat and other garments he was wearing, inflicting a deep gash in his hip about 10 inches long. He was also badly bruised about the body, but no bones were broken. The driver of the other car never stopped, and in the darkness Vansant was unable to get the number of the license plate.

The case of H. C. Willis vs. H. J. McGrath and Company, tomato canners, was tried before Judge Duke Bond and a jury in the Superior Court of Baltimore City, November 29th and 30th. The suit originated under a contract dated April 21st, 1925, under the terms of which McGrath and Company had agreed to pay twenty-five cents a basket for tomatoes and likewise had agreed to furnish him with baskets to pick his tomatoes in. It appeared from the evidence that on a check for one week's
