WOULD HAVE SHORE HOME BUILT HERE

Establishment Hinges On Legislatures Action

Letter Sent To Governor

If the plans proposed by the Kent County Commissioners are carried through the site of the proposed central almshouse for the Eastern Shore counties will be located in Kent.

On November 18, 1926, at a meeting of the Association of County Commissioners held at Easton it was decided by that body that a recommendation be made to the State Legislature that a joint County Home for Eastern Shore Counties be established at some point on the Shore.

At the regular meeting of the County Commissioners of Kent, held yesterday, November 30, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, the President of the various Boards of County Commissioners of the Eastern Shore of Md., at a meeting in Easton, Md., on November 18, 1926, adopted a resolution advocating the establishment of a State Home for indigents of the Eastern Shore Counties and

Whereas, we believe this to be along lines of efficiency and economy, therefore be it

Resolved that the Board of County Commissioners of Kent County heartily endorse the plan and furthermore offer the valuable farm of 320 Acres and buildings, now owned by Kent County and operated as an Alms House, beautifully located three miles from Chestertown, subject to necessary legislative action, to the State, without compensation, for the location of this Institution.

This plan, whereby it is hoped to bring this proposed institution to Kent, was brought to the attention of the County board by T. W. Perkins, president, and M. deK. Smith, Jr., treasurer of the Kent County Chamber of Commerce. The plan met the approval of the commissioners and the resolution was drafted to be sent to the president of the Commissioners Association.

A letter containing a copy of the resolution was sent to Governor Albert C. Ritchie.

In offering the site of the county home to the State for the location of the central Eastern Shore plant the local commissioners felt that should their offer be accepted the county would be greatly benefited. If the Legislature decides to accept the recommendation of the County Boards and establish such an institution it will mean the expenditure of around \$200,000.00 for buildings and equipment.

The need of such a central plant has long been apparent and the Kent Commissioners in taking their stand in favor of such a movement have gone a long way toward having the institution established in Kent County.

In the letter addressed to the Governor the local Commissioners said:

"On November 18th, 1926, the Presidents of the various boards of County Commissioners of the Eastern Shore of Maryland met at Easton, Talbot County, Md., and a resolution advising the establishment of a State home for indigents was unanimously passed.

Kent County is in hearty accord with this movement and in furtherance of same desires to offer our present valuable Alms House farm of 320 acres to the State without compensation for the sight of this institution.

We are enclosing a copy of letter sent by this board to Mr. John A. Baker, president of the Association of County Commissioners of the Eastern Shore who will formally present the matter to you in the near future."


