**A SPLENDID CRUSADE**

The Protestant Episcopal Church in this Diocese closed last Friday night in Chestertown what is known as the Bishops' Crusade. It was what the methodists term, a revival. All are convinced, we opine, that it was a good thing. Nothing can take its place as a renewal of religious faith.

The diocese of Easton was most fortunate in having assigned to it as its crusaders, two such men as Bishop Strider and the Rev. N. B. Groton. Their personalities and gifts made a happy combination for just such work. Bishop Strider's appeal was first to the intellect. In clear cut and forceful sentences he led you from point to point to the summing up of his argument. There was a freshness and originality about his style which kept the hearer interested from start to finish. One felt the reasonableness of everything he said. He made the old truths stand out with convincing appeal to the thinking man of today.

The Rev. Mr. Groton had a very different style. Very quiet of voice and manner one felt all through his talks the beauty, the winsomeness and attractiveness of the Christian life. The appeal was to the heart. There was nothing spectacular or sensational about either of these men. They came to Chestertown in the name of the great Master to tell the Church that the old faith can still meet the highest intellectual requirements of the modern day and that it still makes its appeal to the "hider man of the heart."

Though powerful in its appeal and the interest aroused, the Bishops' Crusade throughout has been marked by the dignity and impressiveness that should attend important religious events. Influence of the revival will be for the benefit of the community.






