Vessels may navigate the entire length of the Chesapeake and Delaware Canal during the hours between sunrise and sunset, providing their draft is not more than nine feet and the vertical clearance needed does not exceed 45 feet.

Thirteen boats passed either in or out of the new Reedy Point entrance to the waterway on the Delaware River Sunday.

The bridge spanning the waterway at Reedy Point is operated by a force of three men, James Maden, electrical engineer, and Wm. J. Bowen and D. A. O'Neil.

On the opening day the steamer Ericsson had to cut part of its smoke stack off in order to get under a bridge at Canal Station. About two inches were taken off, then the steamer proceeded on her trip.
