A COLLEGE WITH A RECORD

The attention of our readers is directed to the advertisement of Western Maryland College appearing in this issue. The college has made a record for thoroughness and excellence not surpassed by any in the State. It holds the highest rating for colleges by the standardizing agencies, being in every respect a Standard A-1 college. The college has recently been honored by the General Education Board (the Rockefeller Foundation). That body, after making a careful and comprehensive survey, gave the college a high rating and made an appropriation of \$125,000 to the Endowment Fund.

We commend Western Maryland College to our readers who may be considering sending their sons and daughters away to college. The college opens Tuesday, September 13th, for its 60th year. Students are advised to register in advance.
